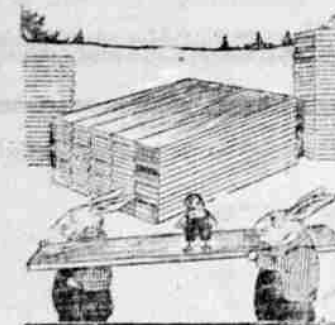

About 10 o'clock Thursday morning the residence of Mrs. M. J. Atteberry in the North part of town was discovered to be on fire on the inside over the kitchen. Owing to the distance from a phone considerable time elapsed before the fire company could be summoned and by that time the whole interior was a roaring furnace pouring out huge volumes of blackened smoke and the structure was seen to be doomed. Only a small part of the contents of the building were saved. The building was owned by Thos. Leffler of Haines and was insured. The loss on building is \$800, and on contents \$200. The fire is presumed to have started from a defective flue in the kitchen.

Eager to Show Prowess.

New York, April 24.—Down at the New York City Farm Colony, on Staten Island, today many of those "young fellows," of sixty or more, will throw their crutches away and kick up their heels in carnival. Joseph D. Flick, superintendent, has arranged a three days' festival, beginning today for the 1,314 inmates, who work with the officers to make the institution practically self-supporting. Plans for the youthful old men's gambol have been approved by John A. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Charities, who agrees that boys will be boys regardless of the three-score-year handicap. Among the more strenuous athletic events will be the fifty-yard dash for "boys" sixty years young and over; bag race, potato race, shoe race, three-leg race, crutch race, fat man's race and a twenty-yard walk for cripples. For the aged youngsters on whom the burden of years rests heavily there will be other contests of a non-athletic character. Prizes will be awarded for the best personal appearance, the best school garden (of which there are ninety-five) for the cleanest kept bed, for the most efficient work in tending hogs and for the best work in cleaning up the premises for spring. "Then, we have found that some of the men can sing," Mr. Flick added with a chuckle. "So we include in the awards prizes for the best rendition of Irish, Scotch, German and English songs."

The Alaska-Gastineau Mining Company of Juneau, Alaska, has added an additional 12,000 h. p. to its generating plant by driving a tunnel through a mountain and tapping the bottom of Annex Lake. Annex Lake is 13 miles long, 1-3 mile wide and about 200 feet deep. The additional 12,000 h. p. gives the company 18,000 h. p. for use at the mines.

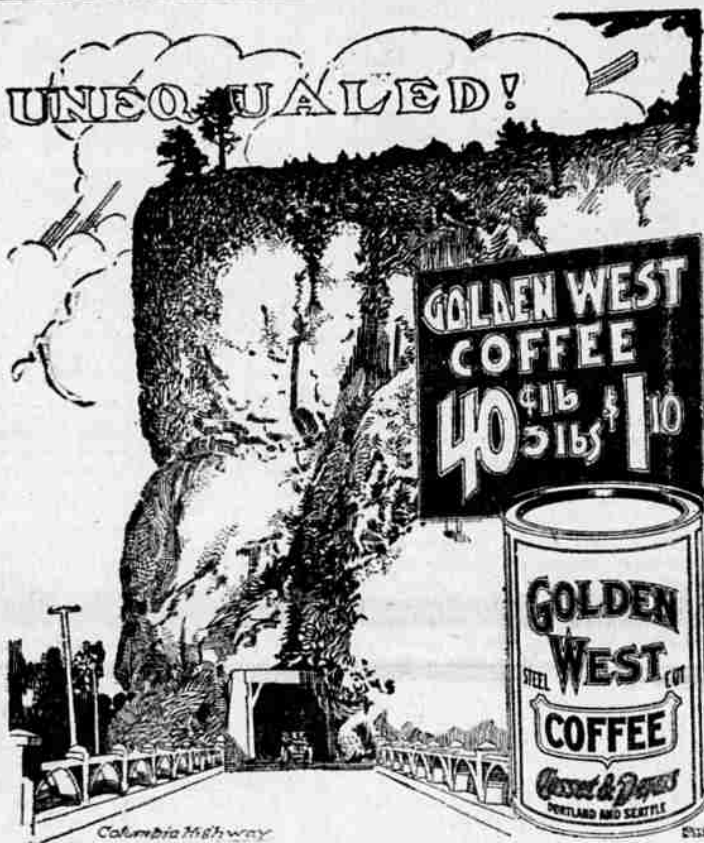
