MANY LAWYERS TRYING SUIT

PORTLAND DRUG FIRM CLAIM CONSIDERED.

Many Interests Concerned in Litigation Over Sanatorium.

A battery of attorneys, representing various interests directly interested, are before Circuit Judge Knowles today trying the claim of the Woodard-Clark Co. of Portland, of about \$4000 against the Hot Lake Sanatorium company. The Portland drug firm seeks to press a claim upon the property asserted to have been effective prior to the present mortgage. The case is an important one and a group of prominent lawyers are on hand. R. G. E. Cornish of Portland and Cochran & Elchard of La Grande represent the drug company, George Willis represents the Topaz Land company and P. L. Willis, Crawford & Eakin of La Grande represent the Hot Lake Sanatorium company, Geo. Pierce and Walter M. Pierce, while Attorney Robbins represents the Hot Spring company, the unit of the railroad company which operated the sanatorium for a time.

E. P. Woodard is here from Portland in the interest of his firm.

Hollister, of Jefferson City, Mo., clerk to the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations, of which Senator Stone is chairman, has been acting secretary of the Democratic National Committee since the death of Thomas J. Pence. He was appointed assistant by Mr. Pence and handled the office under Mr. Pence's direction for several weeks. Mr. Hollister has conducted two campaigns for Senator Stone, was with the Clark pre-convention forces in 1912 and after the convention helped to elect President Wilson. It is believed likely that his present position will be made permanent at the Democratic convention in June. Mr. Hollister is unmarried.

Registration Not Finally Reported

Salem, Or., April 24.—Estimates were made at the office of the secretary of state today that the registration for the primary election would be approximately 225,000. The registration reported up to the present time is 217,779, but a number of counties have not yet forwarded their complete lists. Of the total number reported at the secretary's office, 146,000 are Republicans, 64,251 are Democrats, 1169 are Progressives, 5134 are Prohibitionists, 4900 are Socialists and 6325 are miscellaneous.

Baker Child Drowned

Baker, April 25.—A sad accident yesterday was the tragic death of Jesse Frederick, the little two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen H. Jackson, the little tot being drowned in an abandoned cesspool on the Jackson dairy ranch just south of the city. The old cesspool was uncovered and filled with surface water, into which the child fell. He was soon missed and search resulted in finding the little fellow, but too late to save him. The grief-stricken parents have the sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement.

REGENTS SLASH BUDGET.

Expenditures Authorized Fall \$80,000 Below Departmental Estimates.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, 22.—On the recommendations of President Kerr the O. A. C. Board of Regents at its annual meeting here today cut \$80,000 from the totals recommended by the heads of the departments.

President Kerr told the Board that he had held a personal conference with every department head, urging the necessity of the most rigid economy in making out estimates for the coming year, and that these men had excluded everything not deemed absolutely essential to the accomplishment of their work. Although these specialists know the condition and needs of their work as intimately as it can be known, it was necessary to make the heavy cut in their recommendations.

There will be no new buildings authorized, except an experimental feeding laboratory costing about \$5000. Equipment costs will be a little heavier because expenditure in this line last year was but \$2000 in contrast to a normal expenditure of \$30,000.

A department of agricultural education to fit teachers of agriculture was authorized, with the professor of the same to be selected soon.

A professor of logging engineering, Mr. Van Orsdale, who leaves a ten-thousand dollar job to take the college work, was elected. This is the first department of the kind to be established in the United States, but is necessary to meet the demand for managers of gigantic lumbering operations.

The Board frowned down all talk of having the name of the College changed to Oregon State College.

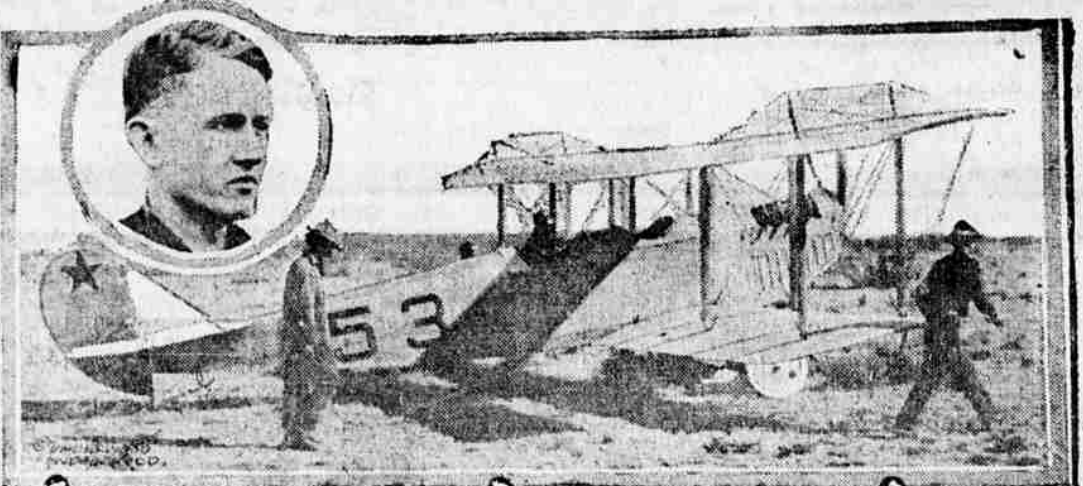

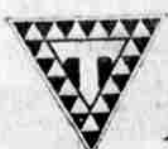

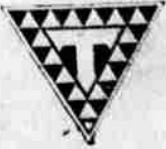
