COUNTY MEET CANCELLED

UNION ONLY OTHER TEAM IN COUNTY.

Friendly Tryout to Be Conducted Instead of County Contest.

The county track meet which had been scheduled for this coming Saturday has been called off. With the exception of Union and La Grande there are no other school track teams in the county and owing to lack of training the Union boys are not willing to enter a dual meet with the local team, but have agreed to bring several men over Saturday to enter into a friendly tryout which Captain Conkey and his men are to hold in preparation for big Baker-La Grande dual meet on the 6th. Little is known of the Union team, but Perkins who placed third in the high jump last spring is among the visitors who will make the trip, and several of the basketball men are entered.

The locals are now training daily at the fair grounds, the track at the high school being only good during wet weather, and are rounding into shape fast. Coaches are making desperate efforts to get the distance men into condition as this seems to be the weak part of the team. Minnis, of Pendleton, who took the mile so easily here last spring is reported to be running both the half and mile and if this is so the locals will have to show some speed to get in ahead of him. Boylen of the same town is also going good in the quarter and a great race will be seen at the Eastern Oregon meet when Landreth and Boylen tangle in this event.

The tryouts Saturday will start at 2:30 and the admission will be free.

KING GEORGE GIVES PARTY

Maimed Soldiers and Sailors Brought Back to Palace.

London, March 29.—King George gave a party at Buckingham Palace for 1000 sick and wounded soldiers and sailors from various London hospitals.

Some of them had to be carried in on stretchers and others came with nurses. Some were totally blind. From the moment the King and Queen, accompanied by Princess Mary, Prince Albert, in military uniform, and a small retinue, entered the palace riding school, where their guests had gathered, till the final burst of cheering ended the festivity, the monarch and his men were equally at home and pleased with one another.

WANTED: MAN'S PARENTS.

On Eve of Marriage Youth Suddenly Learns He Is Adopted Son.

Birmingham, N. Y., March 26.—Ray Frederic Ide, of Philadelphia, on his wedding eve, is seeking information in this section which will reveal the identity of his parents. So far as ascertained he was born Frederic Stimson Dove, Elmira, September 31, 1896. He was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. James Curtis Ide when eight days old. Where his parents went is unknown. Fourteen years ago Mrs. Ide died. To her daughter, Mrs. John Deininger, of 922 Green street, Philadelphia, on her deathbed she confided the secret that Ray was not their own son, but instructed her to keep the secret and rear Ray as her brother.

The secret was kept until a few days ago, when Mrs. Deininger imparted the information to him because of his approaching marriage. The shock proved severe to him and caused a nervous breakdown. A search is being made in this vicinity by the police for evidence that will settle the question before the arrival of his wedding day.

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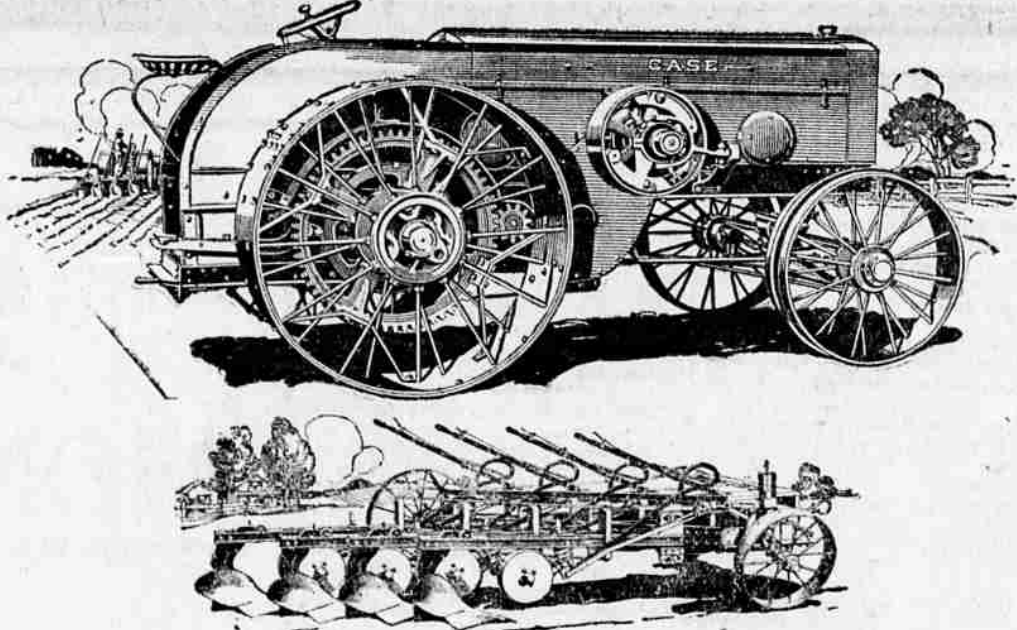
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
