Concerning the sugar market, a Portland paper said last night: "Wednesday morning the price of all grades of refined sugar here and elsewhere along the Pacific coast and in fact the United States will reach the highest figures ever known."

"There will be a general advance of 15 cents per hundred pounds here which will place the wholesale price of dry granulated at \$8.15 or 5 cents above any previous quotation known here."

"The trade confidently expects a further sharp rise in the price here soon because of the growing strength of the markets along the Atlantic coast. The great purchases of sugar in the American buying territory by Europe is reported as the sole cause of the advances of late."

"Some forecasts are out for an early advance of 25 cents per hundred pounds above the present record price."

TALLEST IN MORNING. Examiners for Marine Corps Discover Interesting Fact.

Washington, D. C., April 26.—Men are taller in the morning than in the evening, medical examiners for the United States Marine Corps, declare, and the applicant for enlistment who is of medium or small stature has a better chance just after breakfast to meet the height requirements than at any other time during the day.

The discs of cartilage between the vertebrae of the backbone yield considerably to the pressure due to the weight of the body, when it is erect, and expand themselves while the body is in a recumbent position.

This effect may amount to as much as half an inch in the case of a heavy man, say 5 ft. 10 in. in height, according to the Marine Corps medical examiners.
