Thousands of Sacks to go by Steamer to Europe New York, April 26.—There were 11,000 sacks of first-class mail in the postoffice yesterday awaiting shipment to England on the American liner New York.

It is for the United Kingdom, France, Belgium, Spain, Portugal, Italy, Russia, Africa and Asia. By the time the New York sails it is expected there will be at least 2,000 more mail bags and 1,500 packages of parcel post.

Western Governors to Meet Salem, April 26.—It has been definitely decided that the Western Governor's Conference will be held at Salt Lake City this year immediately prior to the National Governors' Conference which convenes in that city.
