**Egg Drying Is Treated**

Washington, D. C. April 28.—The frozen and dried egg industry, declares a new publication of the Department of Agriculture, is a permanent one because it meets a district economic need. Many eggs which could not stand long shipments may be preserved as wholesome food by freezing them out of the shell or by drying. In the beginning, however, there was a natural popular prejudice against the business, which was increased by the ignorance and carelessness of some of the pioneers. It was under these conditions that the Department of Agriculture undertook a study of the problem in order to lay the groundwork for a scientific preparation of an extremely perishable product. Some of the results of this study have just been published in a professional paper, Bulletin No. 224, A Study of the Preparation of Frozen and Dried Eggs in the Producing Section.

The eggs commonly used by reputable firms for breaking, are small or oversized eggs and dirty, cracked, or shrunken eggs. To the trade these are confused with eggs that are unfit for human use, such as the classes known as black, white mixed and sour rots, green whites, eggs with stuck yolks, musty and moldy eggs blood rings, etc. These should be rejected entirely or else used for tanning purposes only. Eggs with a bad odor should be rejected absolutely.

Careful candling before the eggs go to the breaking room, is one of the principal points upon the importance of which the new bulletin insists. Careful candling is not only necessary to prevent the use of unfit eggs, but it will also prevent the waste of a

number of perfectly good eggs, which might otherwise be rejected. In order to insure that the eggs are well candled the bulletin recommends some system by which the work of individual candlers may be checked. Eggs that it is found difficult to grade should be set aside by the regular candlers for examination by an expert. Furthermore, the eggs should be graded again, when out of the shell for certain kinds of infection can only be detected when the eggs have been broken. (When grading eggs out of the shell, only two grades should be recognized—food eggs and tanner's eggs.)

The bulletin also discusses in some detail, the measures necessary to procure cleanliness in egg-breaking establishment. It emphasizes the necessity for separate rooms for children candling, breaking freezing and drying the eggs. Each should be maintained at a definite temperature by artificial refrigeration. A room for washing and sterilizing the utensils should adjoin the breaking room. When a bad egg is found, all apparatus contaminated by it must be exchanged for clean, and the hands of the operator washed before beginning work again. The production of frozen and dried eggs, is said, is primarily an industry for the egg-producing sections.

Many eggs that now reach the large consuming markets in a totally unfit condition could be saved and a large portion of the annual waste eliminated if they were treated in time.

**Spite Shed is Put Up**  
Minneapolis, April 22.—Mrs. Pierra has rented. She has consented to give up her farmhouse at 1913 Main street NE, and will claim \$21,683.75, placed for her by the park board when her property was condemned for the use of the city in constructing Bottineau field.

But she did what she threatened to do and today an unsightly shed stands in the center of the field. The strip of land, 83 feet wide, Mrs. Pierra claims by right of adverse possession, for she says that she has had the tract fenced for more than the required 20 years. The land originally was part of Twentieth avenue NE, but was never opened. According to Superintendent J. A. Ridgeway of the park board, the court was asked to decide the ownership of the land, and no decision may be reached for two years, during which time the shed will stand in the center of the park.

**CIRCUS SOLD AT AUCTION**  
Philadelphia, April 20.—The doom of the "ten-twenty" circus was sounded

when "Porgie" O'Brien's one-ring collection of "stupendous and dazzling features" was sold at auction at the Bull's Head Bazaar, Market street near Thirty-eighth. For years the little circus had toured the by-ways leading to the little towns of this state, attracting the patrons with its lurid posters of "daring riders and ladies of the flying trapeze."

"There is no money in the ten-twenty circus," said George Lawrence, proprietor and inheritor of the outfit. "The three-ring fellows have knocked us out. John Garret, of West Chester, bought most of the horses. Diamond, a performing horse, was bought by Miss Julia Allen, of 4830 North Front street, who is a noted bareback rider."
