TRACK TEAM GOING WELL

SATURDAY TESTOUT SHOWS GOOD FORM.

Conditions Favor Fast Meet With Baker Here Saturday.

The last test for supremacy among the local high school track men before the 1st annual Baker-La Grande meet was held at the fair grounds last Saturday and although the day was none too perfect several records made the previous week were bettered, Millering lowering his time in the high hurdles, Larson increasing his broad jump almost a foot and his javelin throw by 15 feet, and Hap Moon bringing his time in the low hurdles down three-fifths of a second. Lynx Larson won individual honors with 23 points taking two first, four seconds and one third. Captain Conkey only making 20 points out of his usual four firsts.

This week's training will put the finishing touches on the team and they will be in the best of condition by the time the Eastern Oregon is held. But just now all eyes are turned to the dual meet with Baker, and coaches are putting forth all efforts to round out a team that can hold its own with the minors. If the locals show up well in this meet they will stand some chance of finishing in front at the big meet, so the events Saturday are going to be watched with interest.

ROSE SHOW INTERESTS

Businessmen of Portland Have Plans Well Matured for Show

Portland, Ore., April 29.—Although the Tenth Annual Rose Festival will not be celebrated until June 7, 8 and 9, Portland is today making active preparations for the event.

This year the national dedication of the Columbia River Highway will take place the afternoon of the opening day. The new roadway has made the gorge of the Columbia passable for automobiles and other vehicles for the first time in history.

Indications are that there will be thousands of visitors in Portland for the event. President and Mrs. Wilson, members of the president's cabinet, crowned heads of Europe, representatives of foreign governments at Washington, governors of all states, the premier of Canada and British Columbia, the governors of Hawaii and Alaska, and senators and representatives have been invited to be present and participate in the dedication of the new highway to the tourist travel of the world.

Portland will crown its Rose Festival queen the evening of June 6, preceding the formal opening of the Rose Festival on the morning of June 7. Portland's central feature this year will be the great Rose Fountain and festival center, covering more than 80,000 square feet, the greatest floral display of the kind ever built.

The crowning ceremony will take place at the festival center. This will enable the queen to ride crowned in the children's parade the following morning. The fortunate young Oregon girl selected queen of the fiesta will also be crowned queen of the highway at the ceremony at Multnomah Falls on the afternoon of June 7th.

The annual floral parade, which will bring out more than 5,000,000 rose flowers on review, will take place the afternoon of June 8, the second day of the festival, and June 9, closing day, brings the fraternal, military and civic pageant. The annual rose show will be a feature, as will the first annual regatta.

EGGS THREE YEARS OLD?

Sterilized Product, Now Served in Hotels, Reported "Fresh"

Philadelphia, April 29.—You're liable to get eggs served you at some of the hotels and restaurants in town that are two and three years old. But don't worry about it. A scientist has invented a machine for "sterilizing" eggs that makes them almost as good when they're three years old as when

they are a few days old, and there need be no apparent worry about eating the eggs.

Professor Charles H. La Wall, chemist of the State Dairy and Food Commission, has looked over some of the eggs that were labeled as having been laid in 1913 and 1914, and he says he found them to be first class in every respect. The eggs were solid, looked very much like the fresh product, and when candled they were found not to have shrunk.

Further investigation led to the discovery of a machine which had been used in the process of "sterilizing" the eggs. All that Professor La Wall could learn of the process was that the eggs were placed in the machine and dropped first into hot and then cold oil. The pores closed, the shells were strengthened and the eggs sterilized.

"That's all I know about the methods of sterilization," said Professor La Wall. "The eggs were turned over to me for examination, and I found them in good condition. They were labeled as having been laid two and three years back, and I learned that they have been served in some of the hotels. From a food standpoint, they are in good shape, but how the sterilization is done I haven't the least idea."
