In Memoriam

Died, at La Grande, Oregon, on Friday, April 28, 1916 at 7 p. m., Elsie Jane, daughter of J. W. and Martha J. Kennedy, aged 24 years, 2 months and 10 days.

She was born at Union, Oregon, on the 18th day of February, 1892, spending her early childhood days in that city.

With her parents, she removed to the City of La Grande in 1899 remaining there till 1906, and during the next four years residing for periods at La Grande, Union, Baker and Portland, Oregon.

In the public schools of these cities she completed the eighth grade and advanced into the tenth grade of the high school. During the same period she diligently applied herself to both vocal and instrumental music and became an accomplished musician and vocalist of local repute.

On Sept. 10th, 1910, she was married at Union, Oregon, and began life as helpmate and housewife.

In the spring of 1912 she was attacked by an illness which steadily and within a few months developed paralysis and in a very short time she became a helpless paralytic, baffling the skill of the best physicians.

With varying periods of improvement and relapse she struggled heroically for the existence which her dreams in single life had pictured for her in the marriage state—always devotedly and persistently aided, as-

sisted and encouraged, with every means at their command by her loving and devoted parents, sisters, brothers, friends and kindly physicians, till January this year, the last relapse occurred which steadily and surely brought her within the folds of that grim and unconquerable Master, death.

Elsie was always of a loving, kind and cheerful disposition—charitable, conscientious and true—devoted and constant in all her relations with others and possessed of the true Christian spirit and taking pride in her professions and manifestations of such spirit. She had been a member of the Christian church since thirteen years of age.

She leaves to mourn her premature departure from this earth, father, mother, one brother, Wm. Kennedy of Hermiston, Oregon, three sisters, Mrs. B. F. Wilson and Mrs. M. W. Huffman of Union, Oregon and Mrs. R. A. Wilkerson of Meacham, Ore., besides numerous other relatives and a host of friends.
