HOGS ESPECIALLY FIRM IN PRICE.

Few Cattle and Fewer Sheep Offered at Portland.

Portland, May 1.—There was a steady to strong tone in the swine division of the North Portland yards at the opening of the week's trade, despite the fact that the run over Sunday was liberally increased. The country is showing an inclination to market its hogs freely, this being especially true of Idaho points.

Only a few carloads of cattle came forward to the North Portland yards over Sunday, and the general trend of the trade was safely maintained at last week's figures.

Trades in the sheep and lamb division of the North Portland market continues quiet, with a very small run reported in the yards over Sunday. Totals were but 30 head.
