Portland's Great Event.

Portland, May 1.—The queen of the 1916 Rose Festival with her maids of honor will find something of interest every hour during the progress of the June celebration.

The queen will visit the festival center the afternoon of June 6, where with J. H. Dundore, president of the festival and Mayor Albee, she will rehearse the crowning ceremony.

This ceremony will take place the evening of June 6, when Mayor Albee presents her with the key to the city and, in company with the mayor and festival governors, she will inspect the festival center.

Opening day, June 7, the queen rides at the head of the Children's Parade at 9:45 a. m. At 2 p. m. she is crowned "Queen of the Columbia" at the national dedication ceremonies of the Columbia river highway at Multnomah Falls. The same evening she is the guest of honor at a magnificent display of fireworks on the Willamette river in which the reproduction of the sinking of a battleship by a submarine will be presented. Colored lights and the presence of Portland's fire boats will make this a most spectacular feature.

The second day finds the queen present when the second annual Roller Skating marathon is held. In the afternoon she appears in the beautiful floral parade and in the evening presides at the children's sing where more than 5,000 boys and girls take part.

June 9, closing day, features the queen in the mammoth Patriotic, Military and Civic parade, the first Rose Festival regatta and the Uattee carnival parade to close the show. She will also appear at the annual Rose show of the Portland Rose Society and take part in many other functions festival week.

It will be a merry festival time for the ruler of the Tenth annual fiesta in the Oregon metropolis.

AID TO FRANCE BELITTLED.

German Critic Says '5000 Russians' Have Reached Marseilles.

Berlin, April 27, by wireless to Sayville, N. Y.—Major Morant, the military critic of the Tageblatt, in his review of the military situation, alludes to the "5000 Russians" landed at Marseilles. His review, as summarized by the Overseas News Agency today, is as follows:

"The arrival of 5000 Russians at Marseilles illustrates the resolution of France. The French people, who are easily impressed and deceived, are jubilant over the arrival of these Russians, whose coming necessitated a three-months' voyage, but German troops have learned how to handle these 'braves of Russians,' in Galicia and Poland."

PLEA TO BE HANGED MADE

Condemned Prisoner frets at Delays of Execution Secured.

Atlanta, Ga., April 29.—Dave Pruitt has a chance for life, but he wants to die.

His attorneys have found him the most unruly of clients, in that he doesn't care what they do, just so they let him lose his case and go to the gallows.

Dave is to be hanged for the murder of a woman a year or so ago. He was finally sentenced by Judge W. E. Thomas, who is sitting upon the Superior Court criminal bench in the absence of Judge Ben Hill.

Deputy Sheriff Blennie Miner, recently visited Dave's cell. The prisoner told him he didn't care when he died, just so he died as early as possible.

"I don't want to delay it, boss," he is quoted as having said. "But that doesn't matter," Blennie Miner told him. "You have to wait until the court's decree."

"Then I'll hang myself." Forthwith all blankets and other materials that might provide an improvised noose were removed from the man's cell for fear he would commit suicide.

A motion for a new trial was made in his behalf before Judge Thomas. His attorneys hope to gain a new trial, and, if not this, to defer his execution.

But Dave, as he told Blennie Miner and others, is anxious for it to be over with. He's tired of waiting.

BIG CONFERENCE BEGINS.

Quadrennial Gotten Under Way at Saratoga Springs Today.

Saratoga Springs, N. Y., May 1.—As the quadrennial session of the Methodist General Conference opened here today to continue through the month, interest became keen about who will be the bishops. The conference will elect six, perhaps seven bishops, and perhaps more. If a new law is enacted permitting bishops for races, it is assumed a negro bishop will be chosen. One of the clergymen who is expected to be elected a bishop is the Rev. Dr. Ezra S. Tipple, president of the Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N. J. Dr. Tipple is chairman of one of the conference committees. Perhaps the next most talked of man for bishop is the Rev. Thomas Nicholson, of New York, secretary of the Methodist Board of Education. Dr. James Roscoe Day, chancellor of Syracuse University, will attend. Dr. Day is the only living man in the history of Methodism ever elected to the bishopric who refused the honor. Another candidate for bishop is the Rev. Dr. Franklin Hamilton, chancellor of the American Methodist University, at Washington, D. C. He is a brother of Bishop John W. Hamilton, of Boston. The Rev. Dr. L. J. Birney, dean of the Boston Methodist School of Theology, is said to have his hat in the ring. Dr. David R. Downey, book editor of the Methodist denomination just missed election at the Minneapolis convention. Friends of the Rev. Dr. Allan MacRossie, superintendent of the New York district, have episcopal aspirations for him. There is some gossip that Professor F. Watson Hannan, of Drew Seminary, may receive a good vote. He was until a few years ago pastor of one of the largest churches in Brooklyn. Many leading Methodists are of the opinion that some of the new bishops should be chosen among men who have "made good" only as pastors. Among the pastors being advocated is the Rev. Dr. Andrew Gillies, pastor of Hennepin Avenue church, Minneapolis. His salary is \$7,500—larger than that of any other pastor and as large as the bishops' salaries. Other pastors who are possibilities are the Rev. Dr. Charles B. Mitchell, of St. James church, Chicago, the Rev. Dr. Matt S. Hughes, of Pasadena, Cal., a brother of Bishop Edwin F. Hughes, of San Francisco, and Rev. Dr. Charles Wesley Burns, of Germantown, Pa. The Rev. Dr. Bertrand S. Tipple, pastor of the American Methodist church in Rome, may be made bishop for Southern Europe. He is at present in this country. Dr. Ezra S. Tipple is his brother.

New Five-Oven Stove and Big Cooler Part of New Equipment.

Facilities to serve 75 people at the same time have been about completed by the Silver Grill management. The occupants were thrown against a cluster of posts supporting rural mail boxes and the little girl, who is 6 years old, sustained a fracture of the base of the skull and is probably fatally injured.
