Clergymen Assist Marines.

Salt Lake City, Utah, May 3.—The pastors of a number of orthodox churches throughout Utah are co-operating with the United States Marine Corps recruiting officers in this city in procuring recruits for the military naval branch of Uncle Sam's fighting forces.

The clergymen are of the opinion that the Marine Corps is a prime factor for peace in controlling situations which, if badly handled, might easily lead to war, and point to the Corps' recent operations in Cuba, Hayti, and Nicaragua, in proof of this contention.

"The men of the Marine Corps have done more to avert war in the last decade than all the peace societies in America," said one of the clergymen when asked about his recruiting activities.
