COUNTY AGENT NOTES

If you had a stallion that could win the Senior championship at the State Fair three years ago and the Grand Champion last year and the year before and was made Grand Champion in 1914 at both the Lewiston and Walla Walla shows, you would think "you had some horse," and you would have. And then if you had a mare that could win the Grand Championship and the Sweepstake on mare and colt and also the Grand Championship at the State Fair and at the Cascade International and be able to do it several times and not only one year, you most certainly would be justified in feeling proud to own a pair of such animals of any breed. And this is just what "happened" to the Shire stallion, Gores Fashion, and the Shire mare, Oscar Flower, belonging to W. R. Leadbetter of Alicel. Besides winning all these honors they have won several times at the County Fair and the Union Stock show. While the mare also won first as a yearling at the Iowa State Fair and third in the same class at the International, held at Chicago, one of the greatest livestock shows in the world. Then her filly, May Flower, was made Reserve Champion and Grand Champion at the Yakima Fair and won first at Walla Walla and Lewiston.

Gores Fashion is by Warden Harold, by Harold, by Lincolnshire Ladd Second. To those versed in Shire blood lines, that spells the best that can be found in the breed, and his winning and his get certainly bear this out. He has been pronounced the best horse of the breed in the North West, by several competent judges, and he will leave his "stamp" on the draft horses of Union county long after he is dead and gone.

Clydes

Sam Brooks of Imbler was a veteran breeder of Clydesdales. And the splendid bunch of animals of this breed that he sold to W. R. Leadbetter and Floyd McKennon of Alicel are a living monument to him as a breeder and a judge of this draft breed. During the years that he bred these horses he was not only benefitting himself but the community that he lived in and the whole county as well.

Walla Walla in 1914 and Grand Champion at the State Fair in 1915 and first at Yakima and Lewiston the same year. The mare Garono was Grand Champion at the State Fair in 1914 and 1915 and also won the same honors in 1915 at Lewiston and Yakima. Her mate is usually placed next to her in the awards. Other places won by some of these horses are 1st, prize 3-year-old mare at Yakima and Lewiston, also 2nd and 3rd, yearling at both of these shows as well as 1st prize yearling stallion. At Yakima three Clyde mares and one Shire won the first award for best four horse team. While one team of Clyde mares has never been defeated as a team, they won first at the State Fair last fall.

Hog Pasture

One sees a good many hogs of various sizes and "denominations" on as many different kinds of pasture just at present. Fall grain, wild grass, alfalfa, in fact any kind of green, growing, pasture is being used. All of them help but clover and alfalfa are the best. But be our pasture what it may, to keep our pigs growing nicely, we should feed them a small amount of grain. A pound per hundred pounds of pork will keep our stock hogs growing nicely, but to feed no grain whatsoever is not the best practice. Mature hogs get along much better than younger hogs without a little grain, but the younger ones need that little, if you want the best results.

Potato Planting Time

Potato planting is beginning to get under way, and we hope that a good crop and good prices shall await us this fall. At the present time we have plenty of moisture, let us conserve as much of it as we can for our potato crop this summer. Use the harrow as close behind the plow as possible, and again after our crop is planted, particularly when the weeds begin to come. Even after the crop is up you can harrow several times before the plants are so large that harrowing will injure them. If you have not yet planted give the seed potatoes a soaking in formaldehyde at the rate of one pint to 30 gal. of water, can soak four batches of seed in the same

solution before it is necessary to make a new one. In all probability your potatoes will come somewhere near the average, and I have seen very little seed stuff that did not need such treatment.

Pendleton, May 5.—An Indian kyu-wit, a feast with which, from time immemorial the redman has celebrated the advent of spring and its blessings, was held at noon today at the home of Amos Pond on the reservation and was attended by about 75 men, women and children. The dishes consisted of the first foods of the year to which the Indians in times gone by had access, the salmon of the streams, the camas and kauf of the mountains, strawberries and other fruits besides dried meats, pies and cakes.

There were 27 men present, 33 women and many children. Among the well known Indians present were Pokier Jim, Captain Sumpkin, Chief Umapiene, Jim Spokane, Tom Loy, Luke Minthorn, Luke High Bear of Lapwai, Jim Ye-mau-wit, Mitchell Lloyd, Allen Patawa, George Red Hawk, Kop-lots, Ko-ta-tams, William Barnhart, Luke Bay, Paul Jones and Tico-ne. Rev. J. M. Cornelison and Rev. William Wheeler, missionary and pastor at Tatuilla, were also present.

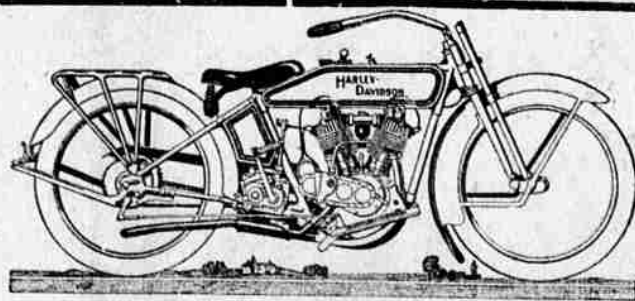
