PROHIBITION CONVENTION

STATE DELEGATES CHOSEN
LAST EVENING.County Ticket Nomination Left in
Hands of a Committee.

Delegates from Union county to the State Prohibition convention in Portland May 19th were elected in a county convention held at the Methodist church last evening. The convention was presided over by the president of F. W. Emerson, a vice presidential possibility, who has been in this vicinity of late in the interest of national prohibition. He told the convention that the prospects were indeed bright for national prohibition. The chief business transacted last evening consisted of election of the state delegates and naming a nominating committee in this county to select, if deemed desirable, a county prohibition ticket. It is not likely that a complete ticket will be launched, but considerable talk of asking L. L. McKennon, of Union, to go into the general election campaign for the office of sheriff running as a Prohibition-Democrat was heard after the convention. The nominating committee consists of George L. Cleaver, Imbler; Roscoe West, La Grande; Hattie M. Clark, Union; L. W. Morgan, La Grande and Mrs. Para Thornton, La Grande. The delegates chosen to the state convention, some of whom at least, are making arrangements to attend, include: L. L. McKennon, Hattie M. Clark, T. J. Martin all of Union; E. F. Roberts, Cove; Nora Webb, Alice; W. C. Combs, Roscoe West, La Grande; J. A. Gaskill, Imbler; J. H. Henderson, Elgin.

Vetoed Measure Goes to People.
Silverton, Ore., May 8.—Mayor W. Bowser, of this city, a few days ago vetoed the ordinance calling for bonds for an auxiliary water system. The bill for the ordinance was the members of the Silverton Commercial club for a month and 50 business men of the city had given their personal guarantee that this auxiliary water system would be installed. This system would be necessary to secure the Silver Falls Timber company's new mill, which depends upon the water system. The Mayor's veto was overridden by the council which passed the ordinance over the Mayor's head, and a special election will be held in the near future to have the people pass on the bonds.
