NOTICE OF THE RECORDER OF the City of La Grande, Oregon, of the Re-Assessment of Improvement District No. 54 of the City of La Grande, Oregon.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Re-Assessment for the improvement theretofore made of South Fourth Street from the south property line of O Avenue, formerly O Street, in Chaplin's Addition to the town of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, to the north property line of C Avenue, formerly C Street, in the town of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, under the provisions of Ordinance Number 834, Series 1916. "An Ordinance approving the re-assessment made and filed by the Recorder of the City of La Grande on March 8th, 1916 for the cost of the improvement of Fourth Street in Re-Assessment District Number Fifty-four, from the south property line of O Avenue, formerly O Street, in Chaplin's Addition to the town of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, to the north property line of C Avenue, formerly C Street, in the town of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, as modified and corrected by the Commission of the City of La Grande by Resolution of said Commission of April 28th, 1916; levying an assessment upon the property in said

re-assessment district number fifty-four, benefited by such improvement; providing for an assessment roll for such re-assessment and directing the entry of the assessment by this Ordinance levied on the Bond Lien Docket of the City; providing when said assessment shall become delinquent; and providing for the payment of said assessments and interest thereon in installments, the same being in improvement District No. 54, in said City of La Grande, Oregon, is now in my hands for collection and the same may be paid to me at any time within ten (10) days from the 8th day of May, 1916, without penalty, interest or cost; and each owner or reputed owner is hereby notified that on application to the undersigned within ten (10) days from the 8th day of May, 1916, which is the first date of the publication of this notice, they will be allowed to pay such assessment in ten (10) annual installments, the first installment thereof being due and payable on or before the 8th day of May, 1917. If application is not made as above specified, the whole amount is due, payable and will become delinquent on the 20th day of May, 1916. The assessment roll is as follows:

O-W. GRANTS REDUCTION IN RATES SATURDAY.

Track Team Leaves Friday—Francis May Not Compete.

Rates of one and a third fares amounting to \$2.10 for the round trip, have been procured for track team followers who expect to attend the Eastern Oregon classic at Baker next Saturday. The tickets, on the certificate plan will be good on all trains that day. No. 6, leaving here at 11:25 will reach Baker in time to let the visitors see the meet if taxis are used between the Baker depot and the fairgrounds.

The La Grande track team will leave here tomorrow night on No. 18, but the number of men to be taken along by Coach Reynolds is not definitely determined. Owing to financial losses on account of postponing the meet last Saturday, it has been found necessary to curtail the delegation from here.

That the mighty Francis, Baker sprinter, who was going to give Glen Conkey the run of his life in the 50 yards, may not be entered at all, is the prevalent belief. It is thought Prof. Strange of the Baker schools will keep him out because he is over 21 years. The matter was under discussion last Saturday in La Grande but it is now thought that the Baker superintendent of schools will apply the iron hand. If Francis is out, it practically eliminates Baker from taking the meet and further enhances Pendleton's opportunities to win it. La Grande faces a difficult task next Saturday as Pendleton has an exceptional squad this year. A year ago the La Granderes lacked one in defeating the Roundup town, but this year's score may not be so close—and then it may be reversed. Who can tell?

Postpones Shearing. Pendleton, May 11.—Albert E. Smith of the Smith Livestock company was in Pendleton from his home three miles south of Pilot Rock today. Mr. Smith says there was frost at his place last Sunday morning. The shearing of the Smith sheep was to

have been started last Monday but, owing to the condition of the weather, no shearing will be done until the days are warmer.
