"MELTING POT" TONIGHT

STORY IS INTENSELY INTERESTING ONE.

Repeated Performance Will Be Open to the Public This Time.
"The Melting Pot," which is to be repeated tonight in the Neighborhood club room at the library, is a gripping drama from the pen of the master playwright, Israel Zangwill. The subject so vividly dealt with is that of a young Russian Jew whose family was victims of massacre and who has escaped to America.

The theme of America as the vast nations who are blended together and finally from which will come the ideal American, is of peculiar fascination. David, whose lines are handled so capably by Dr. Margaret Ingle, is a musician who composes a magnificent symphony, which tells the story of his dreams.

Intense dramatic interest is aroused by his meeting here of Vera, (Florence Happersett) the daughter of the baron who had charge of the Kishineff massacres and later with the baron himself, who comes over in search of his daughter. The love story is intense, the racial hatred realistically portrayed and the ending one of the most beautiful and touching imaginable.

FIRST VIEW OF RUSSIAN SOLDIERS IN FRANCE.



Here is the proof that Russian soldiers reached France at least two weeks before the news of the arrival of some at Marseilles was permitted by the censor to be made public. These photographs were taken during the first part of April. They show detachments of 10,000 Russians, who reached Toulon from Dalny and Vladivostok. They were taken to Paris where they drilled for some time before they were sent to the front, about 100 miles east of Paris.

The two views show the Russians drilling in Paris barracks while French marines look on. It is understood that on their arrival in Toulon the government said they were Serbian refugees. The Russians uniforms were made for them in Paris, and uniforms for 300,000 more are believed to have been made.

Women Voters Threaten.

Salt Lake City, May 11.—Women voters of the country here today considered whether the pen, after all, really is mightier than the sword. Unless the pen shows results shortly they say they are going to declare war with the political sword on the Democratic party. This was the decision contemplated by the conference. They threaten to organize a women's party, which they claim will hold the balance of power in the November election, and fight the Democrats—unless the Democrats "come across." Cruelty to that child of the suffragists, the national amendment enfranchising women, is the charge laid by the delegates today against Democrats who have held the amendment in committee and threaten to keep it there. If the child is not dressed in a new cloak of approval by committeemen and brought before the House for consideration—favorable consideration—this summer, the women say there will be new hands in the Congressional pork barrel after November. A delegation of women, following the two day meeting here will be sent on to Washington to deliver this message. They will be on a suffrage special with the 23 envoys who just wound up a tour of suffrage states, whipping the women into line. They will be met at Washington by crowds of supporters. The biggest demonstration yet at the Capital awaits them, according to press agents. Both parties have promised strong suffrage planks in their platforms. This doesn't satisfy the delegates. They want real action.
