Meaneast Man in England is Dead. London, May 11.—Lord Clanricarde is dead. Lord Clanricarde! The man the British people called "the meanest man in England." What the London papers did to his memory, even before he was buried, was sufficient. "The Meanest Man in England!" For half a century he held that distinction. Today, in glaring columns, amidst the war news, the London papers told the story of Lord Clanricarde's life. It is a story particularly for Irish folks in America. It was men like Clanricarde who drove the Irish to America. He was the meanest Irish landlord. Clanricarde's grandfather was Canning, British prime minister in 1827. His uncle was the first viceroy of India. When he was young Clanricarde got the idea that God made a few very rich, fine and cultured people to be human beings and that everybody who wasn't rich, fine and cultured wasn't human. Human rights, as he knew them, were the rights of the rich. Canadian soldiers in Hyde park, not knowing their London, have looked with wonder and pity on a little weakened old man, in ragged, fifty-year-old clothes who used to sit on the public seats—the private seats cost two cents—a hard, cold look in his eyes. This was Lord Clanricarde, owner of twenty square miles of land in Ireland, with Irish peasants paying him \$150,000 a year. This was Lord Clanricarde, once the swellest top in London, victim of the idea that God made him to be a specially fine human being, with special rights. In 1874 he fell heir to the castle at Portumna, one of the finest houses in Ireland, and the estate of 60,000 acres. He thought he had fallen heir to the lives and souls of his tenants too. He paid a visit to the estate in 1874. He never returned. His tenants had demanded certain improvements and rights. He sent agents. More than one of them was killed. There isn't an acre of the land that hasn't its tragedy. Homes were broken up by poverty because of Lord Clanricarde's high rents. He demanded a large share of everything the tenants grew; he would not spend money for improving their pitiful homes. Blood was shed time and again, while he was in London, pottering around with antiques. Irish landlords changed and became human; Lord Clanricarde, never. The government refused him police aid in evicting tenants; he hired agents to do the evicting. Decent people began to leave him alone. Of all the money he took in from his tenants he is never known to have spent a cent for improvements. He stood pat on the idea that human rights were the rights of the rich. The splendid castle fell into ruins. Other Irish landlords began to sell their land to the government, to be distributed among the Irish peasants. Clanricarde would not sell. A special bill was introduced into the house of lords, expropriating his estates. Though he was a lord and was entitled to sit in the house of lords and help in the government of his country, Lord Clanricarde never appeared until the chances of losing his land arose. One day a shabby, bent, hardfaced little old man appeared at the door of the house of lords, but when he attempted to enter the policemen stopped him. It was Lord Clanricarde. He protested in a piping voice. He talked of property rights. Property had its duties as well as its rights, said someone. Then he walked out of the place. He became a solitary miser. He spent money for antiques only. His cheap rooms were filled with rare articles, littered about, carelessly. No fire burned in his grate. Antiquy dealers and the lawyers he hired to try to prevent the government from taking his land were the only human beings he knew. Last year, the government won. Today the Lord Clanricarde estate is being divided for sale to small holders. Lord Clanricarde was paid a million and a half dollars by the government and the day after his death, while he rested in his rich mahogany casket, he got a million and a half dollars worth of the bitterest advertisement that was ever given a human being.
