AT THE ARCADE.
"For the Defense."

After having created such a success in "The Cheat" and "Tennessee's Pardner," Fannie Ward, the distinguished American actress, will be seen at the Arcade tonight and tomorrow, in the Jesse L. Lasky production of "For the Defense," which was written especially for her by Hector Turnbull, author of "The Cheat."

In "The Cheat" Miss Ward was seen as a wealthy young society woman; in "Tennessee's Pardner" she was a little orphan girl in the early days of California; in "For the Defense" she will be seen as a little French novice, direct from the convent. It is a Paramount picture.

The plot of "For the Defense" has to do with the adventures of the little French girl who was sent to this country by the Sisters in France to escape the war zone. How she es-

capades from a runner of a disreputable house in New York who persuaded her to go with him, and is the only witness to a murder, how she afterwards, unknowingly, meets the man who is falsely accused of the crime, and falls in love with him, and how, by a clever trick, is able to get a confession from the real murderer and thus exonerate the man she loves from conviction, tends to make a picture dramatic in its theme, stirring in its action and unusual in its motive.

It is expected by the Lasky company that this production will score even a greater success than "The Cheat" and with this idea in view, have surrounded her with a cast of unusual excellence, composed of such famous artists as Jack Dean, Horace B. Carpenter, who scored such a success as the drunken husband in "The Golden Chance," James Neill, Camille Astor, who will be remembered as the Duchessa in the "Chimmie Fadden" series, Gertrude Kellar and other

members of the Lasky all star organization. The production is made under the direction of Frank Reicher and the photography is of the usual Lasky excellence.

AT SHERRY'S TODAY

Film Warns Against Drug Habit. Police officials, sociologists and the

great army of men and women engaged in the uplift of humanity, agree that the use of habit forming drugs is the greatest curse of mankind. To combat this menace; to secure a decrease in the use of narcotics, and to cure those who have become addicted to opium, morphine, heroin and cocaine, there has been formed a nationwide organization which is to crusade against the frightful evil.

Until February 9, 1909, opium was allowed to be imported, under a duty of \$6 per pound. At that time the Hariman-Bloch law was enacted by Congress prohibiting further imports. The average importation of opium at that time, amounted in round figures to two million dollars.

The Federal law became operative very largely through the influence and interest of Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt.

The Chinese Government officials cooperated with our own authorities in the effort to stamp out the importation of the most deadly of habit forming drugs. The trans-Pacific steamship companies likewise do all they can do to discourage the traffic, and there is a standing reward in cash to members of any ship crew for the disclosure of the hiding place of opium on shipboard.

Every steamer or sailing vessel entering any Pacific Coast port is searched with almost incredible thoroughness. The risk is appalling and penalties are severe, still the illicit traffic continues, largely superinduced because of the great demand and the high prices opium brings through the many Chinatowns of America. Tons of opium that sold for \$15 previous to the enactment of the Federal legislation, now bring \$90, and the demand vastly exceeds the illicit supply. "Hop, the Devil's Brew," is the

name of this tensely interesting film, which will be exhibited at the Sherry theatre today and tomorrow for the purpose of arousing public interest in the nation-wide anti-drug crusade in this community. The film is being shown simultaneously all over the country.

To make the appeal more direct and engaging the smuggling operations and trafficking in opium have been woven into a story of great human interest. The photoplay tells of the insidious effects of the drug and how the use of opium nearly wrecked the life of a daughter of the "King of the Opium Smugglers."

In producing the film every episode which bears upon the smugglers and distribution of opium has been based upon actual happenings since the law of 1909 went into effect.
