Alicel, May 15.—(Special).—The school at Alicel is making preparations for celebrating May Day in typical style.

Cruiser To Be Submarine Tender

Seattle, Wash., May 13.—Orders were received at the Puget Sound navy yard canceling the two months' cruise of the cruiser St. Louis, which was to have begun May 22, so that repairs can be completed by July 15, when the St. Louis will be sent to Honolulu for duty as flagship and tender of the submarine flotilla stationed there.

Seventy-four men of all ratings left by train last night for San Francisco to complete the crew of the cruiser Albany, in accordance with orders received after the vessel steamed south with only a reserve complement aboard.
