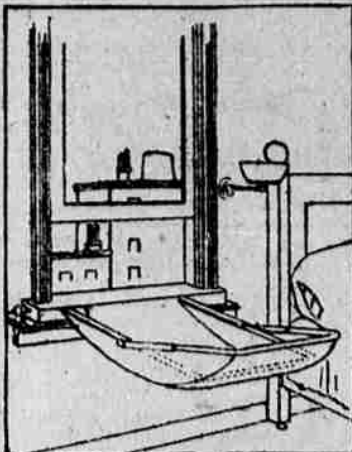

HELPFUL HINTS FOR HOUSEWIVES

Device For Catching Rain Driven In Open Window.



This window trough, which has been recently patented, is designed for the open air sleeper who does not want to be put to the inconvenience of getting out of bed to close the windows when a rainstorm comes up in the night and who does not want to be deprived of the health giving drafts of fresh air during the continuance of the storm.

In fact, the progress of the storm may be regarded with complete indifference so far as the likelihood of its doing any damage in the interior. The trough is made of canvas, treated with a waterproofing material, rubber or some other material, which will hold water, which is mounted on a collapsible frame and secured to the sill of the open window. Any rain or snow which is hurled in the opening by the wind will be caught in the trough and may be emptied at one's convenience.

Cleaning Ostrich Feathers.

You may always clean white ostrich feathers in the following manner: Make a good lather of lukewarm water and pure soap. Dip the feather up and down in this until clean; then rinse and shake before the fire until dry. When finished, curl with a silver knife. Be sure not to hold the back of a feather toward the fire; always let the ends curl toward it. Wings and quills that have become soiled may be made to look like new in the following manner: Put them in a box filled with cornmeal and shake them gently. When this is finished brush off the meal with a soft brush.

Red Tiles and Marble.

To make red tiles a nice bright, clear color the following is very good: Rub well with a lemon dipped in fine salt. Leave it for a few minutes; then wash in the usual way. You will find this well worth the trouble, for when it is finished the tiles will be a nice, clear red with all stains removed. For removing dirt and stains on marble you will find that gum arabic is excellent. Make a solution of the gum arabic and water, letting it remain on until it dries. Then peel or wash it off and the dirt comes with it.

Cream Cheese on Toast.

One tablespoonful of flour, one tablespoonful of butter, one-fourth cupful of cream, one-eighth tablespoonful of salt, three-fourths cupful of scalded milk, sprinkling of cayenne, one cupful of chopped cheese, one egg. Mix flour with cold milk, stir in scalded milk and boil five minutes. Add cheese and when melted add salt, pepper and butter and the beaten egg. Cook one minute and pour over slices of toasted bread.

Cranberry and Raisin Pie.

Make a rich pie crust and line a deep tin. On bottom of crust put one cupful of plump raisins; then pour over them one cupful of sweetened cooked cranberries, to which has been added a tablespoonful of cornstarch moistened with water. Put strips of pastry across the top in lattice fashion and bake in moderate oven until the top is a delicate brown and the sides of crust draw away from the tin. Serve cold.

Creamed Fish.

Separate cooked fish into flakes. Rub one teaspoonful of butter smooth with one teaspoonful of flour. Add three-fourths cupful of milk and salt and pepper to season. Cook until thick and smooth, then add one cupful of the fish flakes. Simmer three minutes and serve garnished with half slices of lemon and buttered toast points.

Cheese Straws.

Grate two ounces of cheese, mix well with two ounces of butter, two ounces of flour, two ounces of bread-crumbs, season with cayenne and salt to taste. Roll out very thin and cut into strips one-fourth of an inch wide and six long. Lay on buttered tin and bake brown.

To Clean White Flannel.

To remove stains from white flannel suits and similar things try rubbing them with a mixture composed of equal parts of yolk of egg and glycerin. Let this remain on for an hour and then wash in the usual way.

Polish For Glassware.

A brilliant polish for glassware can be secured by adding a little turpentine to the washing water, about a couple of teaspoonfuls to the gallon.

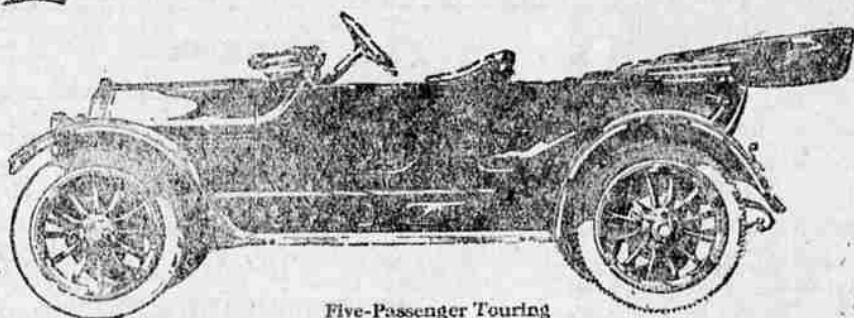
