AN OPEN LETTER.

Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe Discussed Coming Primary Election Issues.

To the Editor: In the stress of a busy life, making it impossible to see my friends personally, I am taking this public opportunity of asking the readers of your paper to assist me in the primaries now near at hand.

I came to La Grande twenty years ago and many of you know me from my work in the schools. Through the knowledge of my profession and self denial I have carved out a home in the city of La Grande where I have been a taxpayer for fifteen years. After years of service in the school room I was appointed your county school superintendent on the resignation of Mr. E. E. Bragg, and for three years endeavored to demonstrate that a woman can also make good in this office.

Concerning women in educational work the United States bureau of education says: "There are women who are college presidents, county superintendents, directors of industrial training, head of departments of education in colleges and universities."

Of the nearly three thousand county superintendents of the country 508 are women. Montana has not one man as county superintendent, and Wyoming has only two. The government bureau of education itself exemplifies the call for women in executive educational positions; eleven of the 33 bureau officials listed in the directory are women.

We live so closely to Idaho, Washington and Colorado that we all know their state superintendents are women. I have conducted my term of office in such a manner that our own State Superintendent J. A. Churchill wrote me of his surprise that I should have any opposition in the primaries and expressing his unqualified approval of my work.

The boys and girls of Union county are now my family, and as it says in the Book of Books, "God setteth the solitary in families."

I shall earnestly appreciate your support at the polls.
