

Twenty Reasons Why Vote For Bonds

BANKER: Then it means a stop to this endless tax for poor roads. For forty years this county has been levying a tax of two mills or more for roads, and they are just the same as ever, nothing permanent. This bond issue is paid off on less than two mills per year.

MERCHANT: On my assessment of twenty thousand, I'll have to pay less than forty dollars a year. With every idle man in Union County employed next year, I'll make more than my share of that bond issue.

BANKER: And still we will have the roads to develop the country and make us prosper.

Drops Dead in Midst of Address
Boise, Idaho, May 16.—Colonel Henry C. Olney, of Sand Point, Idaho, dropped dead from heart failure yesterday while addressing the annual state convocation of Royal Arch Masons. He had just thanked them for the gift of a gold chain from the members, and was telling them that a Spokane physician had warned him that only by a miracle could he reach Boise alive, and that it would be doubly a miracle if he ever lived to leave this city after the Masonic meeting.
"But I believe in miracles," he said, then died.
Colonel Olney was a Civil War veteran, 74 years of age. A son, H. W. Olney, of Colfax, Wash., and two daughters, Mrs. H. I. Parr, of Spokane, and Miss Pansy Olney survive him. At one time he was on the staff of the Denver Mountain News and later published a newspaper at Boulder, Colo.
