WORK IS PRAISED.

Head of Government Indian School Is Complimented.

Praise for work now being done by Miss M. V. Gaither, former head of the government school on the Unalaktila reservation, is contained in a story by the Sioux Falls Press of May 11. The story will be of interest to local friends of Miss Gaither and is as follows:

A few days ago a reporter of The Press had an opportunity to inspect first hand the Springfield government Indian school girls, where 60 pupils are being thoroughly trained in all branches of industrial education, such as cooking, dressmaking and laundry work, as well as music, art and academic work. Upon entering the grounds one cannot help taking notice of the one main object which is kept in view at all times. The buildings which themselves have the appearance of neatness and cleanliness are surrounded by large well kept grounds, reminding one very forcibly that Uncle Sam never does anything by halves.

Upon entering one of the class rooms the visitors came upon a class of a dozen 10 to 12 years old, probing into the mysteries of cooking. In another room a class of older girls were being taught to do laundry work and dressmaking, in style and design equal to that done by any white girl. These departments of the school are presided over by Indian girls who are graduates of the Haskell Institute and are under the employ of the government.

Superintendent Miss M. V. Gaither, formerly instructor in the Carlisle school, who conducted the party through the building, takes just as much pride in the academic work, which is carried on in accordance with the course of study as recently compiled under the supervision of Cato Sells, commissioner of Indian affairs, and well she may, for the thorough work she is turning out in both the academic and industrial departments rivals the best model white schools.

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FOLEY HOTEL IMPROVEMENTS

DINING DEPARTMENT TO BE ENLARGED.

Mr. Foley Will Inaugurate Double System in Table Service.

Very elaborate and extensive improvements in the dining department of the Foley hotel are under way. To begin with the main dining room will be completely overhauled and made as attractive as it is possible to have it. With this end in view steel ceilings and panels are being provided and the whole interior will be artistically decorated.

Adjoining the dining room is to be established a grill room and this also will have the most minute attention in the way of attractiveness. The work on these improvements is under way but it is of such an extent and character that it will not be fully completed for several days.

Pat Foley, proprietor, has the idea in view of establishing a double system in the culinary service at the hotel, and this has resulted in the experience he has had in recent months in the way of providing a service at popular prices. This latter proposition has proved out to such a favorable extent that he will not only continue but enlarge the popular service feature and at the same time will be prepared to supply the grill service for those who may prefer that system. In the outcome there will be both the popular service, ranging in price from 25, 35 and 40 cents, and more elaborate attention to patrons with the higher range in prices.

The improvements and contemplated changes in arrangements come under the head of progressive enterprise and will no doubt meet with the highest appreciation on the part of the patrons of the Foley hotel.

Physicians Are Accused.

Seattle, Wash., May 19.—Four physicians were charged with violating the prohibition law by issuing prescriptions for liquor without just reason to believe it was needed for medicinal purposes, in informations filed in the superior court yesterday by the prosecuting attorney. The physicians named in the informations are Dr. S. H. Starbuck, Dr. Wyllis A. Silliman, Dr. Milton A. Van Dyke and Dr. Y. Yamamoto. The prosecuting attorney said his agents had no difficulty in obtaining liquor prescriptions from the physicians. The warrants will be served today.

Information was also filed charging J. P. Chase and B. Sliter, proprietors of the Smith Drug company, with violating the prohibition law. Another information charged John C. MacDougall, manager of the MacDougall Transfer company, with having had in his possession an illegal amount of liquor. Six barrels of beer consigned to a drug store were found in Mac Dougall's warehouse by the police last week.
