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**ARGUMENT FOR PEACE**  
 MOVING PICTURE TO TELL ITS STORY  
 Sherry's Theater Soon To Have Great War Film

Peace-loving United States and its citizens who, as spectators, are watching the terrible conflict of nations across the ocean, find it difficult to appreciate the vastness of the world-war. Word paintings fall far short of describing it and tales of its scope are varied. The camera tells the story as nothing else which accounts for the pronounced success the European War pictures, which are soon to be shown in this city, have met with.

This moving picture description brings home to audiences the terrible burden the people in the warring nations have to carry.
