## GRADUATES HEAR SERMON

"ACHIEVING SUCCESS" THEME OF THE SPEAKER.

Inspiring Setting Witnessed by Big Audience Yesterday Morning.

Learned hints on achieving success were presented to the graduating class of the La Grande high school yesterday morning at the high school auditorium when Rev. W. A. Winters, D. D., presiding elder of the La Grande district of the Methodist church, spoke to the graduates, their parents and friends, faculty and student body. The setting was a beautiful one, and the service one long to be remembered. A large attendance was present to witness the ceremony and hear the baccalaureate address.

Speaking from the text I Cor. 9:27, "I keep under my body and bring it into subjection," Rev. Winters touched upon essentials of right living and pointed to the route that leads to success. He said in part:

Many things are assets to the success or failure of mankind, Heredity, health, wealth, training, environment, opportunity etc. These things are circumstances that help form the background of a man's life and he fails or succeeds as he is controlled by or controls circumstances. Will he be slave or master? is the question.

Two wills have to do with a man's success—God's and man's—but only one will has to do with his failure—his own. Oh yes we may have reverses, misfortunes and lose much in many ways, but a man has not failed until he ceases trying and gives up in despair.

God as creator gives to man his possibilities—sets him up in business with raw material, sometimes, very raw, and expects him to manufacture life's products—all wool and 36 inches to the yard.

The world needs your honest ability rightly applied. Your friends are anxious for your success and God expects you to make good; to increase, develop and utilize the possibilities with which you are entrusted; to broaden your vision, increase your usefulness, generate power, economize in strength, grow in wisdom and so master the details of your own life that there may be no waste of resources but that the capital and products of life may increase many fold.

To accomplish this three things are necessary. First you must have a fixed purpose. Beecher expressed the same conviction when he said "There is nothing like a fixed, steady aim with an honorable purpose." It's a man squaring himself for the work of life.

We admire men with fixed purposes; men that will stand by their convictions, though, like Luther Savonarola, Lincoln and the man of Gallilee, they must sometimes stand alone.

Second. If a man would succeed he must consider the circumstances surrounding him and the things with which he must contend. Only thus can he wisely prepare for the conflict of life.

Third. He must control circumstances or overcome them. We will group these circumstances under two heads. (a) General including heredity, wealth, training, environment, opportunity etc. These and others we must control.

We must also control circumstances, in particular, those which are personal such as health, flighty memory, lack of perseverance, morbidness, disposition to neglect, calling it bad liver instead of laziness, and bad habits.

Oh the wrecks along the shores of time caused by lack of control over self. Here is where Alexander failed. He conquered the world but did not conquer his own personal habits and died a slave to his own passions.

Ernest Fox Nichols, president of Dartmouth College said: "The body and intellect needs the oversight and firm control by such directors as character, integrity and conscience; and that men meet failure or shipwreck by a blunt moral sense, a weak and treacherous will, an undisciplined mind or an uncontrolled body."

Paul was in a way of success when he said "I keep under my body and bring it into subjection." How well he succeeded let this royal hero of the ages tell. Just before his martyrdom, his life's work ended, we hear him say: "I am now ready to be offered and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord the righteous judge shall give me at that day; and not to me only but unto all them also that love his appearing." How has he succeeded? With a fixed purpose controlling circumstances alone? Hear the divine voice when he is endeavoring to overcome his weakness. "My grace is sufficient for thee." Again hear this mighty man of God as he tells his real secret of success: "I live, yet not I but Christ liveth in me." No wonder he could keep his body under and bring it into subjection. And we can succeed in the same way.

D., 1916 at 7:30 o'clock P. M. at the Commission room in the City Building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when the Commission will meet, hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievances of persons interested therein and affected thereby.
