PRISONER IS DODGING WORK

BAKER COURTS ARGUE OVER AUTHORITIES.

County Court Refuses to Pay Board Unless Prisoner Works.

Baker, May 23.—That the county would not pay the board expense incurred on account of Frank Schrack's imprisonment in the county jail unless the prisoner is turned out and allowed to go to work on the county roads, was the statement this morning of County Judge J. B. Messick. Schrack was returned to jail yesterday by Sheriff Anderson on order of Justice of the Peace Hubbard, after

Judge Messick had pardoned the man.

Sheriff Anderson declares that Judge Messick's order to put Schrack on the county roads, is not binding, since he asserts, it takes the prisoner from the sheriff's custody, while according to statute Schrack must remain in charge of the sheriff. Moreover, Mr. Anderson says, the order does not specify any particular supervisor to whom Schrack is to report to work, or provide any means of guaranteeing that the man will report. Schrack is still in jail.

20 PRESIDENTS HIS RECORD

Illinois Man Hopes to Ballot in Twenty-first Contest This Fall

Bloomington, Ill. May 2.—Having the distinction of voting at 20 Presidential elections, more than any other man in Illinois, Thomas S. Wilson, of Richland Township, Mercer County, is looking forward to the election of next November, when he hopes to

cast his 21st vote for the Chief Executive of the Nation.

Mr. Wilson is now in his 101st year, having been born in Maryland August 20, 1815. Coming to Central Illinois in his early youth he has resided in the state ever since.

On the occasion of a recent family reunion he was photographed with his son, D. L. Wilson, of Aledo; his grandson, D. W. Wilson, of New Windsor, and his great grandson, Glen Grady Wilson.

The centenarian resided for a few years in Menard County and there formed the acquaintance of Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglas, together with other prominent men of the ante-bellum era. This acquaintance of these notables, Mr. Wilson outliving all.

In 1850 the centenarian married Miss Marion H. Melvin. Seven years later she died. He was married for the second time to Miss Charlotte Anderson in 1859. The second wife survived until 1910.

Commencing his career as a contractor, Mr. Wilson constructed many of the buildings in Rock Island among them being the historical Harper House and other landmarks of that vicinity. In 1850 he constructed the present homestead in Mercer County and which he has occupied for 66 years. His daughter, Mary, and grandson Henry are now making their home with the old man.

RICH PLAN PALACE

Millionaires of New York to Disport Next Winter, Probably

New York, May 1.—The millionaires' ice palace near the Plaza, just off Fifth avenue will be a gorgeous and exclusive place wherein New York society will disport itself next Winter.

The public will be quite excluded. One's blood must be of the bluest of the blue to get in at all; and the membership is limited at that.

The palace will have mirrored walls, balconies inclosed in glass, log fires on cold nights and showers for use after strenuous work on the skates. Carnivals and cotillions on the ice are planned. Among the sports will be interclub hockey matches, tennis and curling.

An option has been obtained on a site in this neighborhood and the corporation, with a capital stock of \$200,000 preferred and \$250,000 common, has raised enough to guarantee the success of the project.

GIRL NEAR DEATH FORGIVEN

Aged Father Demands Justice for Blighted Life of Daughter

Chicago, May 1.—Caroline Kister died the other day without uttering one word of her tragic charge against William A. Callahan, her companion, who she said dugged and mistreated her in the Normandie Hotel.

"Good-bye all! Say good-bye to everyone for me, and believe me innocent." They were the girl's last words, uttered ten minutes before her death. She was free of all pain then and smiled slightly, although she did not open her eyes nor turn her head to the gray-haired little man, "Daddy," who sobbed beside the bed, and said, "I believe, I believe, Carrie."

The father, Franklin Kister, and Miss Frances Gallagher, of 4448 Dover street, were the only persons in the room except hospital attendants. The end came as natural as sleep.

The girl's father sat beside the bed for several minutes after she was gone, twisting his hands and moaning "Carrie, Carrie, Carrie!" and "My poor little girl!"

A lonely, desolate figure in the baggy much-worn suit, he was a little hurt and bewildered because of "Carrie's" failure to speak to him. He had come to the hospital at 9 o'clock in the morning. The girl smiled at him and Miss Gallagher and said a few words. Then she was silent until 10 minutes before her death, when she said good-bye.

The body of the girl who swallowed poison rather than face life again will rest near her birthplace in Arlington, O. The father will take the body back with him.

"I want the law to take its course," said Mr. Kister. "I want no revenge, only justice for the life of my poor little girl, which was blighted and made impossible by the wanton act of this man."

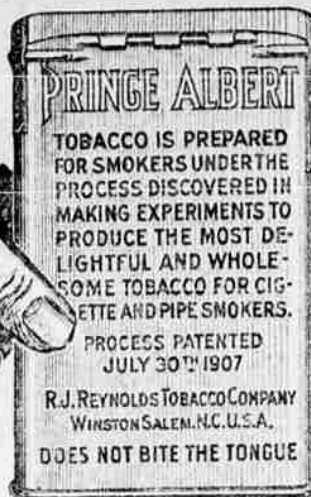
JAPANESE PLAN CHANGE

For educated women to devote their time to such service is uneconomical from the point of view of the conservation of human energy.

TAPPING WIRE STARTLES FINANCIERS OF METROPOLIS

"Send A Man—Don't Phone" Was The Result Of Mayor's Order

New York, May 17.—"Listening on the wire", in order to obtain information regarding the collection of funds for charities has affected the volume of telephone business in the Wall Street District. The "tapping" of the telephone wires, upon authority granted by Mayor Mitchell, in order that the police might be free to listen in whenever they wished, has affected the methods of the big financial houses, with the result that information, worth millions to the right persons, is not passing as freely over the telephone wires as in the days when the senders were more confident that the danger of their secret leaking out was negligible. No one has any ob-

jection to the police supervision of charities' telephone messages, since the purpose is to safeguard genuine charity and honest relief work. However, Wall Street has adopted a plan whereby messengers will do a lot of the work that formerly was conducted over the wire. "Don't phone—send a man", is the method frequently adopted in handling the most important business of the day.

Seven Villa Followers Hanged

Deming, N. M., May 19.—The seven Villa followers captured after they had taken part in the Columbus raid, and who were sentenced to death by Judge Edward L. Medler here April 23, were

hanged at Santa Fe penitentiary today.

At the time they were sentenced, the prisoners pleaded that they were ignorant of where they were going at the time of the raid and that they were forced to follow Villa under penalty of death.

Six of the bandits listened unmoved to the sentence of death, but the seventh, Jose Rangel, who had been wounded in the raid and was carried into court on a cot, cried for mercy.
