CROWNING OF ROSE QUEEN

ALL PORTLAND AGOG OVER THE COMING FIESTA.

Magnificent Floral and Electric Decorations for the Big Event.

Portland, May 25.—(Special)—The evening of June 6 will witness the crowning of the Rose Festival Queen at the Festival center. Mayor Albee will present the ruler of the fiesta with the key to the city after J. H. Dundore, President of the 1916 Festival, places the crown of roses on the head of the queen.

After the crowning the queen will view the display at the festival center. A military escort will clear the way for the official party and they will spend an hour looking over the floral exhibits. The queen at this time will officially dedicate the Rose Fountain, central feature of the display covering 80,000 square feet, and the first feature of the kind ever built in the country.

Preceding the crowning will come a parade from the city hall to the festival center. Broadway will be gaily decorated for the fiesta and when the queen and her party reaches the intersection of Alder and Broadway it will be the signal for the first illumination of this thoroughfare.

Some of the most magnificent electrical decorations ever seen are being built and will all be in place the afternoon of June 6 for the first display that evening.

The Festival this year will in many ways surpass those before it, as the following program will indicate: Wednesday, June 7th, 1916.—10:00 a. m., Children's parade, Grand avenue; 3:00 p. m., dedication Columbia Highway at Multnomah Falls; 8:00 p. m., Evening Fireworks—River spectacle. Opening of Rose Show at Meier & Frank's Store. Sportsmen's association tournament under auspices Gun club at Jenne Station near Portland.

Thursday, June 8th—Roller Skating Marathon, Annual Convention Oregon State Bankers' association, Floral Parade, Children Singing, Formal ball in honor of Queen and her Court of Honor.

Friday, June 9th—Military, Fraternal and Civic Pageant Rose Festival Regatta in co-operation with the Oregon Yacht and Portland Motor Boat clubs. In the evening, Ualtees Procession and Carnival. Dancing on street in evening 8:00 to 9:00 o'clock. Reduced fares will be in effect from all states except from points on the Ilwaco and Columbia River Division per Tariff Circular No. 182-1916.

Liberal Endowment Subscribed.

Announcement was made a few days ago that a voluntary committee had raised a fund of over one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for "The Felix Adler Scholarship Endowment". The amount was subscribed without any public notice having been given—and following the publication of the news item there were such substantial additions to the original sum, that it is now expected that the sum will reach between two hundred and fifty thousand and three hundred thousand dollars. The fund will be completed in time for a formal presentation to Dr. Adler at one of the occasions during the celebration of the fortieth anniversary of the movement, which begins May 14th. There are more than seven hundred and fifty students in the Ethical Culture School in New York, and fully one half of the fellowships for these students are maintained in the school year after year by private subscriptions. The new scholarship endowment will make these scholarships permanent. Dr. Adler was the founder of the Ethical Culture Movement, and he has been its leader for forty years. As a feature of the celebration which is to include the divisions of the society from all parts of the country, it is the desire of the members of the societies to pay personal tribute to the great work done by their leader. It was realized, however, that no personal gift could be made that would be acceptable to Dr. Adler, and therefore the scholarship endowment was devised, in the belief that it would best perpetuate Dr. Adler's work.
