Irrigation Ditches Discussed at Meeting
of Commission.

All members of the City commission were present last evening when the mid-week session was held for the transaction of such business as might come before it. A bit of municipal improvement came to a head when there were no remonstrators present to object to building a piece of sewer between Cedar and Walnut. Specifications for another piece of sewer in that vicinity were laid over.

A resolution dealing with an uncompleted agreement between the city and the Grande Ronde Irrigation company, came up for consideration. The city several years ago passed a resolution concerning right of ways through Blocks 13-14 of East addition but the agreement was never drawn and the matter now in hand purposes to complete the previous agreement.

Irrigation was a general theme last evening. A week ago a petition was filed asking that the Sargent-Wright ditch which takes its water near the Palmer mill, be made safe and repaired generally. The petition came up for consideration last evening and has been referred to the city manager. Various other routine matters came before the commission for consideration.

OREGON BOYS AND GIRLS.

Many Prepare for Future Life Work
by Taking Short Courses.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 25.—Twenty-four Oregon boys and girls will attend the two weeks short course at O. A. C. as prize winners of State Industrial club work with all expenses to be paid by donors of the prizes. A number of other girls and boys have won county and local prizes which entitle them to the same privileges.

The fourth annual session of short courses for boys and girls in agriculture and home economics will begin at the College on June 19 and extend to June 30. Pupils of seventh and eighth grade rank and of high school grades are eligible for admission. The number of prize winners attending will probably not exceed forty while there are accommodations on the campus for about 100. The remaining sixty will be accepted in the order of their applications provided they are eligible. All these except the forty must come at their own expense unless they are selected as representatives of some school or organization that pays the expenses.

The boys will live in Cauthorn hall and have instruction and recreation separate from that of the girls. Their work will be in open field, orchards, gardens, green houses, barns, shops and laboratories rather more than in class rooms. They will enjoy indoor and outdoor sports including swimming and baseball and hikes to nearby points of interest.

The girls will live in Waldo hall under the management and supervision of regular college officers. These officers and instructors will supervise games, recreation and campus life to see that each girl gets the individual benefits and enjoyment to which she is entitled. The girls will study cooking, sewing and drawing in the home economics building. The work in cooking will consist of preparation of different kinds of food, planning and serving meals, preparation of picnic lunches and care of the kitchen. The sewing will be devoted to the making of a simple garment and some form of hand work, embroidery, knitting, crocheting, basketry and weaving. Sewing and physical education in the gymnasium will complete the school work.

Garden of Drugs Planted.

Minneapolis, May 25.—A garden of drugs was planted today by the upper classmen of the college of pharmacy, University of Minnesota. The planting is annual. Seventy-five per cent of the drugs used in the study work are grown by students, and studied while developing.

The prizes ranged from \$1 for the winner in the contest for the fifth grade, to \$5.00 for the winner of the high school contest.
