HERMISTON HAS HORROR.

Businessman Shoots Partner and Then Commits Suicide.

Hermiston, Ore., May 26.—James Ralph, secretary-manager of the Hermiston Light & Power Co., was shot and instantly killed last night about 10 o'clock by Joe Roth, president of the company, who immediately afterwards committed suicide. The double tragedy has shocked this community.

Business jealousy is ascribed as the cause of the terrible deed. That it was premeditated is indicated by the fact that within the past two weeks Roth had signed over all of his property to his wife.

Ralph was shot just at the door of his garage. He had been out driving in his new car and Roth had concealed himself in the garage to await his return. The door of the garage pushed upward and Ralph had just lifted it when Roth fired his first shot. It went through his victim's heart. A second shot pierced the man's temple.

The shots were heard by nearly everyone in town and a dozen men were on the scene in a minute. They found the body of Ralph at once and soon afterwards found the dead body of Roth behind the garage. He had shot himself just behind the ear and death had been almost instantaneous. The shooting was done with a .32 caliber revolver and five shots in all had been fired. He also carried another gun.

Sheriff T. D. Taylor and Coroner J. T. Brown were notified at once and came down. An inquest was held and the jury found a verdict in accordance with the fact stated above.

The two men came here about four years ago to take charge of the light plant. They came from Dayton, Wash., where they had lived for years and where they had been associated with each other almost from childhood. Lately, it is said, Roth had been growing very jealous of his partner.

Roth was about 54 years old. He is survived by a wife and a daughter who was married in Pendleton only last week. Ralph, who was about 40 years old, had been divorced from his wife about three years. His two brothers, Joe and Frank Ralph, are

Disbarment Charge Filed.

Salem, Ore., May 26.—Disbarment proceedings have been instituted in the supreme court against J. R. Greenfield, a Portland lawyer, by the Multnomah County Bar association.

In addition to alleging that Greenfield solicited the defense of Joseph Vartz, in a divorce suit, and also solicited Herbert L. Williams to begin a damage suit, the association charges that he acted for both parties in the divorce suit of Rowe M. Sherer vs. Mary E. Sherer. The complaint alleges that Greenfield secured the decree for Sherer on the ground of desertion and after the decree was granted, Sherer to sue Mr. Sherer for a half interest in property which he had inherited after the divorce was granted. Sherer is alleged to have settled by the payment of \$250 in cash and a note for a similar amount. Greenfield is alleged to have retained the proceeds of the note.

Mr. Greenfield states that he did secure the divorce for Mr. Sherer, and that his client did inherit a \$2500 estate about six months afterwards, and that when Mrs. Sherer discovered this fact she instituted proceedings to secure her share of the estate. Mr. Greenfield says that Jesse L. Sumrall, and not himself, was Mrs. Sherer's attorney.

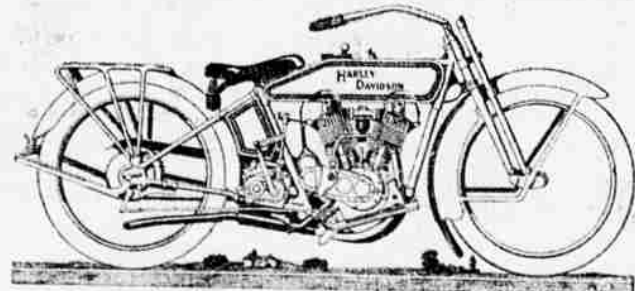
