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DICK BEALE IN MONTANA

OLD TIME LA GRANDE SHOW-MAN IS HEARD FROM. Pioneer Theatrical Promotor Who Met and Overcome Difficulties.

A letter addressed to the late M. H. Kirtley arrived in La Grande this week from Dick Beale, who is in Absarokee, Montana, which he claims is one of the "prettiest little places in the state."

Dick Beale was a marble cutter by trade, but was versatile and did not confine himself to any particular occupation. He owned a marble shop in a small frame structure on Adams avenue on a lot on which D. H. Steward's building now stands.

Dick Beale was also one of the locators of a marble claim on Hurricane Canyon in Wallawa county in the same locality of the mining property sold a few days ago through the efforts of Frank McCully to the Denver company.

Was Great As a Showman He came to La Grande originally as a member of a traveling dramatic company and among all other occupations that of directing amateur dramatic performances was his strong suit. He kept La Grande alive for two or three winter seasons with home-made theatricals, producing such old-time comedies and "dramatizations," as he referred to them—as "Shinguan, the Outlaw of '98", "Ingomar, the Barbarian," "Fanchon, the Crockett," "The Streets of New York," and many others.

La Grande's opera house was the old Masonic hall, which prior to the building of the present structure was moved to the opposite side of the street and near the corner of Fir and Adams, subsequently charred by fire and moved to Madison avenue and reconstructed as a hotel by Contractor J. L. Mars, and now known as the "Glass House."

There were no electric foot lights nor other illumination except from coal oil lamps. In addition to being the general impresario Dick Beale painted his own scenery and arranged his own mechanical and stage effects.

Whatever might be the present day estimate of such shows they were clean and invariably attracted crowded houses and the main part of the success was accredited to the enthusiasm and efforts of Dick Beale.
