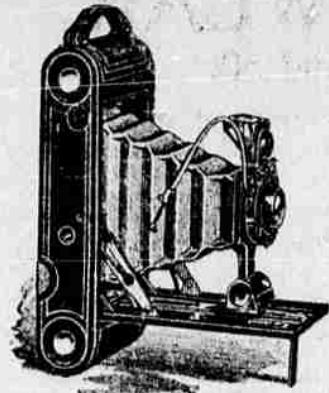

### Horse Shipment From Imbler.

Imbler, May 27.—(Special)—Chas. Todd, the Portland horse buyer, will send out from Imbler today two carloads of horses which he recently purchased in this vicinity. Mr. Todd will accompany the shipment to Great Falls, Montana, where there is said to be a good demand for horses for farm purposes. This is a deviation from Mr. Todd's usual custom, inas-

much as he has been in the business many years and has shipped hundreds of Grande Ronde horses to Portland. That place, he reports, is no longer a reliable market for horses and he is now turning his attention to points further east.
