

## BIG HOLSTEIN HERD IS SOLD

EDWIN MORRISON DISPOSES  
OF CATTLE.

Reported Price for Flock Is \$2000.00  
Cash.

Edwin Morrison, of Summerville, has sold out his herd of Holstein cattle to T. F. Organ, of Cove. The transfer includes thirteen cows and five yearlings also the pair of "oxen" which exhibited at the county fair last fall. The price paid was \$2000 cash. Mr. Morrison has leased his farm and after a trip to Harney county to look over the country he will take his family for a visit to the old home in West Virginia after a continuous absence of eleven years. They expect to be away the main part of the summer and perhaps longer, but in the meantime Mr. Morrison will continue to keep his eye directed on high bred cattle in the east and on his return will continue to handle nothing but "thoroughbred stuff."

### Boston Has Monster Parade

Boston, May 27.—Greater Boston, whose minute men so annoyed the

naefists of 1775, and which is the birth-place of the American doctrine of get-ready, is holding its preparedness parade today.

More than 60,000 men and women will be in line, parading through the narrow streets that once echoed the footfalls of the men in homespun who fell in the Boston massacre, who fired from the redoubts of Bunker Hill and who went to the aid of the farmers at Lexington and Concord.

Lieutenant Colonel Beaumont, B. Buck, U. S. A., is the chief marshal, with Major William J. Keville of the fighting 8th, as chief of staff.

Every member of the house of representatives and the senate will march today, as will many high officials of the Bay State. Members of every profession in the Hub will be in line, including hundreds of prominent lawyers, led by Samuel J. Elder.

The new Harvard regiment, 1100 strong, will be among the marchers before they break away for the intercollegiate meet at the Stadium. The Ancient and Honorable Artillery will be a feature of the parade, in their Colonial uniforms, recalling the days of the Minute Men.

Another feature of the march will be the first public appearance of three newly organized Red Cross base hospital units.

Every unit of the State militia will march, and besides these will be the society women, who already have lodged their homes for emergency hospitals; suffragists, anti-suffragists, business men, fishermen, clam-diggers, society men, at least one son of Colonel Roosevelt; actors, sailors, and particularly farmers, to recall the "embattled" days.

Every band for miles around has

been requisitioned, and 300 marchers from Providence will bring one of their own.

Boston today may not have the quantity that New York in her parade of the 18th produced, but for quality the committee in charge of the Citizen's Preparedness Parade admits it can't be beat.

In the ranks are hundreds of direct descendants of the first disciples of preparedness, those uninvited guests of the Boston Tea Party, and those who heard Paul Revere go clattering by.

### Gompers Begins National Campaign

Washington, May 27.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, is on his way to Chicago today to inaugurate a nation-wide campaign for legislation making state labor laws conform to the labor provisions of the Clayton anti-trust law.

The Clayton law now provides that labor is not a "commodity nor an article of commerce." It effectively prevents prosecution of labor men for attempting, as they see fit, to try to get shorter hours or increased pay. Gompers has prepared a model bill, which he will try to have passed by state legislatures.

Gompers will speak at mass meetings of state labor men in four states—Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Michigan. He will speak at Chicago tomorrow, at Fort Wayne Wednesday, May 31st and at Detroit June 3. In a statement to the United Press just before his departure he said:

"The American Federation of Labor obtained amendments to the Clayton act pointing out that labor is not a commodity nor article of commerce. This frees labor from the application of the provisions of the anti-trust laws and from judicial interpretation of the laws. Under his law a suit such as that against the hat makers of Danbury will not be maintained. The rights of workers to exercise their normal activities for their own protection and welfare have been made lawful."

"The addition to the Clayton law corrects the abuse of the injunctive writ and provides a jury trial in any case of alleged contempt where the 'contempt' was committed outside of court."

"This, however, is a federal law, and covers only federal courts. State laws in many instances make organizations of co-workers amenable to prosecution. The abuse of the writ of injunction with the state still holds."

"Largely the campaign will be carried on by state federations. In Pennsylvania, Georgia, West Virginia, Michigan, Texas, Wisconsin and California, legislatures have acted already to make the demand for this legislation paramount in their political activities."

"In Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, New York, Iowa and Oregon active preparation is being made to make the bill an issue in the state campaigns."

"The campaign will be inaugurated at Chicago tomorrow, (May 28) at a statewide conference. Representatives of all state labor will be present."

"Besides the campaign in those states, organizers will carry the fight to other states—particularly to Utah and Colorado."

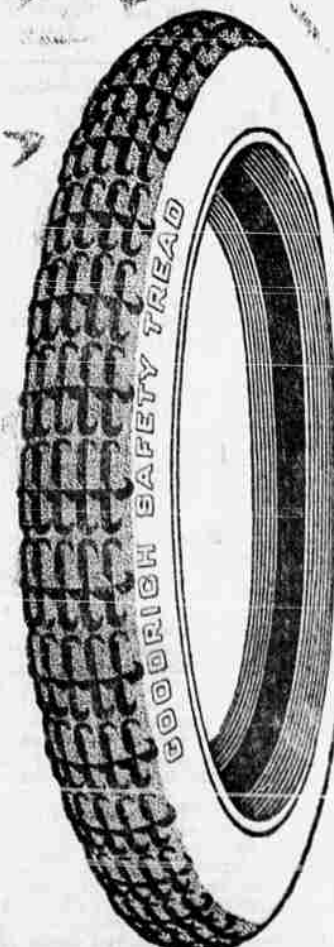
