Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, proposes and intends to improve Section Five of Sewer District Number Three of the City of La Grande by constructing therein a sanitary sewer and that the report of the Committee on Estimates appointed under and by resolution of the Commission of said City of date April 26, 1916, has made its report in writing to the Commission which report was on the 19th of May, 1916, finally approved and adopted by the Commission of said City and said Commission has set Wednesday, the 14th day of June, A. D., 1916 at 7:30 o'clock P. M. at the Commission room in the City Building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when the Commission will meet, hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievances of persons interested therein and affected thereby. That the boundaries of the said District to be so improved, as finally adopted by said Commission is as follows: Commencing at the center of Block Nineteen, in Corgan's Addition to La Grande, Oregon, and running thence west along the center line of said Block Nineteen and along the center lines of Blocks 54, 53, 52 and 51 of Chaplin's Addition to the Town of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, to the center of Fourth Street in said Chaplin's Addition; thence south along the center line of said Fourth Street to a point 120 feet south of the south property line of L. HONOR PAID DEAD HEROES

MEMORIAL SERVICES YESTERDAY WELL ATTENDED.

Baptist Church Scene of Patriotic Homage to Soldiers.

Appropriate Memorial services were held in the First Baptist church Sunday morning at the usual hour. Members of the G. A. R., W. R. C., and Spanish-American war post and camp worshipped as a united body. The church was decorated in a profusion of flags, bunting and flowers. There was a large attendance. Excellent and appropriate music was furnished by the choir.

Rev. J. J. Tichner, the pastor, delivered a fine discourse from the text, Psa. 82:7—"But ye shall die like men and fall like one of the Princes." He brought out in chronological order, the important events in the nation's history, and referred feelingly to those early sturdy pioneers and the privations they underwent. He graphically depicted the horrors of the Civil war and paid a glowing tribute to the memory of the nation's heroes who survive as well as those departed.

The Spanish-American war was referred to, and the speaker likewise praised the young men who responded so readily to their country's call. He stated that that war had done more to unite the North and South than anything that had occurred for many years. The memorable "Maine" incident was referred to and the speaker said that after Admiral Dewey's fleet had finished its gigantic undertaking, Spain had a submarine navy (?).

The assassination of President McKinley was touchingly dwelt upon—"He fell like a Prince and died like a man."

The brave women, "Our wives, sisters and sweethearts," the speaker called them, came in for a good share of credit in the saving of the nation. Rev. Tichner closed with an eloquent benediction, urging his hearers to remember that they are on the march and should ever be on duty until the command comes to lay our armour by and sleep the last sleep that knows no awakening until the resurrection.

United States May Have To Make Concessions

Washington, May 26.—Under the plan for world peace as outlined in the program of the League to Enforce Peace, the United States might have to relinquish some of its older interpretations of the Monroe Doctrine, in the event of a dispute with a European power, George Graft Wilson, professor of international law at Harvard, declared in an address here today before the first national assemblage of the league. Under peace treaties signed in recent years, the professor said, such concessions will have to be made.

"The United States has, within recent years," he said, "become a party to a large number of treaties in which the high contracting parties agree that all disputes between them of every nature whatsoever, to the settlement of which previous arbitration treaties or agreements do not apply in their terms or are not applied in fact, shall, when diplomatic methods of adjustment have failed, be referred for investigation and report to an international commission and they agree not to declare war or begin hostilities during such investigations and before the report is submitted."

"A dispute in regard to the Monroe doctrine or involving its principles whatever they may be would surely be included in the agreement made by the United States to refer 'disputes of every nature whatsoever, to an international commission for investigation and report."

"This report had endorsement by leaders of the present administrations as well as in the action on these treaties by the present administrations and is not to be regarded as embodying partisan policies. The United States is already bound to act as regards the Monroe doctrine in disputes which may arise in most states in a fashion in exact accord with the second article of the platform of the League to Enforce Peace. The aim of the league is secured when the question which negotiation has been unable to settle is submitted for hearing, consideration and recommendation, and it makes little difference whether the body to which it is submitted is called an 'international committee' or 'council of conciliation'."

Avenue and Seventh Street in said Chaplin's Addition, to the center of the inter-section of Eighth Street and said I. Avenue in said Chaplin's Addition, with the necessary manholes and connections, together with the necessary excavations therefor.
