Green peas are a trifle higher, while asparagus is quoting a higher figure. Butter has taken a shade off its price.

### Former Yale Head Dies

New Haven, Conn., May 26.—Rev. Dr. Timothy Dwight, former president of Yale University, died at his home here today.

Dr. Dwight was born at Norwich in 1828 and was graduated from Yale in 1849. He was inaugurated president of Yale College July 1, 1886, succeeding Noah Porter. He was succeeded by Dr. Arthur T. Hadley in 1899. One of his first acts was to propose that the corporation change the name to Yale University instead of Yale College, and that change was made in 1887.

### Aged Halsey Man Dies

Halsey, Or., May 26.—The funeral of Seba H. Halsey was held from the Christian church Wednesday after-

noon at 1:30. Deceased passed away after an illness of only a few days, aged 87 years. Rev. Marion F. Horn delivered the sermon and interment was at Pine Grove cemetery.

### Gypsies Have to Disgorge

Vancouver, Wash., May 26.—(Special.)—A gypsy caravan of 16 autos passed through Carke County Thursday, and the occupants of one car got into difficulties at Lewisville. Four or five men entered the house of a farmer named Thayer, 80 years of age, crowded around him and picked his pocket of \$12.

He sent word here, and Deputy Sheriff Johnson and Barbeau pursued the band and arrested the party wanted. They were taken before the Justice of the Peace at Lewisville. Mr. Thayer did not want to prosecute, so the Justice settled the case by requiring the gypsies to return the \$12 and to pay the court costs. They were allowed to proceed.

### Alaska Democrats to Name Delegates

Juneau, Alaska, May 26.—The Democratic territorial convention perfected its organization yesterday and then adjourned to permit the committees to prepare their reports. The convention is expected to select delegates to the national convention and nominate territorial officers today.

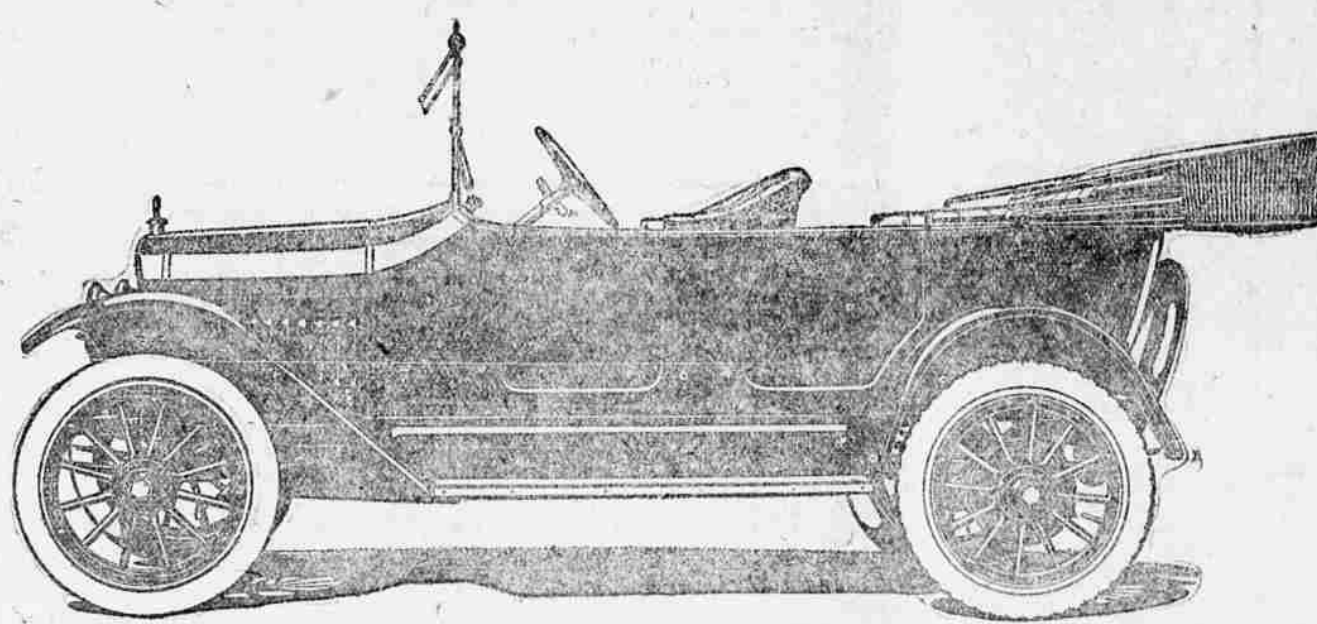

Molalla, Or., May 26.—The Molalla city council at a meeting on Wednesday night decided to have a clean-up day on June 1. The question of a dumping ground for city garbage, which has been in the air for several months, was finally settled when the council allowed the purchase of a tract of land from Oliver Robbins, outside the city limits, to be used for a dumping ground. On clean-up day the city will furnish teams for hauling rubbish that is ready for them that day. Those who are not ready to make use of the teams that day will be obliged to pay the expense of hauling later. The council ordered 500 yards of gravel from the W. V. S. Electric, to be used on city streets. George Marts was appointed street commissioner.

The thieves entered his office by breaking open the door and stole over \$10 worth of gold besides a number of articles of more or less value.
