T. R. CHARGES "PORK"

Secretary of Navy Daniels Is Scored in Letter.

New York, May 29.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, before leaving this city today on a speech-making trip that will take him to Chicago, Kansas City and St. Louis, made public two letters in which he referred to the proposal to confer an officer's rank on a certain number of engineers participating yearly in the naval training cruises for civilians as a "purely political scheme, recommended by Mr. Daniels, will supply the politicians with 30 additional and yearly plum for the next ten years to come."

One letter was addressed to Henry Reuter and the other to Thomas W. Slocum, chairman of the New York committee which is obtaining enlistments for the cruises.

Colonel Roosevelt in his letter to Mr. Reuter said:

"It is well known that the scheme has been framed without consultation with the Navy itself. There have been hearings. The question has not been referred to the general board of the war college—or any board of competent officers. The chief of the Bureau of Steam Engineering, Admiral is on record against it."

Colonel Roosevelt, in his letter to Mr. Slocum, approves of the training cruises for civilians.

BIRD EXPERT BRICKLAYER.

Feathered Artisan Rolls Mud Into Pellets and Erects Good Home. Philadelphia, May 25.—Years ago, before houses and barns were as plentiful as they are now, the cliff swallow used to build his house of tiny mud bricks on the side of a rocky cliff. The nest builders find a convenient patch of clay, roll up the mud into tiny pellets and carry them to their nesting site. There they fashion them into a home as skillfully as any bricklayer could do it, rounding it over the top like a roof and leaving a round opening for a door.

Today the bird doesn't have to find a cliff for his home. A sheltered place under the eaves of a barn will suit him just as well. You'll find more cliff swallows today at home under the eaves than you will in their ancestral castles on the rocks.

The bird wears a shiny blue-black coat and a brownish-yellow vest. His tail, a reddish-brown, is only slightly forked, which distinguishes him from the regular "swallow-tail."

year and three quarters to do is to protect against the upgrowth of this

utterly un-American spirit, to protest against the upgrowth of a spirit which means, if successful, division and impotence in our national life, the breaking up of our unity as a nation, the severance of our citizenship along the bitter lines of old world antipathy. * * * If either the American of English descent or the American of German descent * * * tries to remain with a dual allegiance, with a divided citizenship, he merely ceases to be an American without thereby becoming a German or an Englishman or anything else. He becomes a man without a country who has forfeited the right to be stirred by the feeling of patriotic devotion to any land or to have a special and peculiar kinship with any people. The American birthright is the birthright of all of us; and it is a shame and a disgrace for any man to barter it for so poor a mess of pottage as implied in that kind of hyphenated citizenship which means that the individual tries to be a half-way citizen of two lands and forfeits the right to be a whole citizen of any land."

Colonel Roosevelt went on to cite several men with whom he has been identified in political life, who were of foreign stock—a man by birth a Swede, who the colonel said had done more than anyone else to aid the navy; his scientific assistant on the African trip, a German-American by birth; friends whose strains were of Czech, Bohemian, German, French and other bloods. In his cabinet he said there was a descendant of one of Napoleon's brothers, descendants. One other member had been born in Germany, another in Scotland. He referred also to General Goethals, to Admirals Wainwright and Schroeder and to his own doorkeeper while president, a man by birth a German.

"It would be possible," he said, "to man our entire administration from president down with men of German blood, and of such uncomprising Americanism that every good American could follow them with wholehearted loyalty. * * * I had two sons ready for my country, hold it an outrage and a violation of every principle of true Americanism to discriminate against a man because

of the land from which he or his parents came, or because of his creed. But I hold it none the less an outrage for him to act in our domestic politics not as an American but as an American who has some un-American interest to serve from a foreign country. The man who thus acts is the hyphenated American."

Discussing the German-American alliance and its published statements, particularly the Pennsylvania branch and its warning that leaders of national conventions he warned they must deal with the German-American vote, the colonel asserted:

"Such a statement represents moral treason to the republic. * * * The program on which it (the alliance) wishes American citizens to vote is one affecting Germany and only Germany. I do not in the least object to it because it denounces me. It has denounced Mr. Wilson almost as often and almost as severely. One of its favorite forms of denunciation includes Mr. Wilson, Mr. Root and myself as equally opposed in the interest of Germany."

"It is moral treason to the United States for any of its citizens to act and to seek to attack their governmental representatives without reference to the interest of the United States, in the interest of some foreign power. The German-American alliance is in practice an anti-American alliance. * * * The men who so act are disloyal to the United States. If France had subjugated Belgium I would condemn her just as strongly as I have condemned Germany."

Such hyphenates, the colonel said, "are not merely un-American; they are anti-American to the core; and unfit to be citizens."

Roosevelt said he did not believe the alliance represented the view of the great mass of Americans of German origin. He cited St. Louis' vast contributions to the Union in soldiers of German birth, or parentage during the Civil War as a splendid example of Americanism. He said he understood the mother who interrupted his speech at Detroit recently to say she was Mrs. M. B. Nuer. He said her husband was undoubtedly a German and her sons were American.
