## RAILROAD NEWS

### OLD WELL, HISTORIC LAND-MARK, FILLED.

Special Train to Union Stock Show From Joseph Is Fixed.  
Incident to beginning work on the nine-stall addition to the round house this morning, at which time a crew of 20 men and several teams was set in motion, will disappear an old railroad landmark—the old-time well for many years the only source of water for railroading in this city. The well has been abandoned for several years but because of its historic connections with early railroading, veterans couldn't help but note the fact that it is to be filled. Dirt from excavation for the next stalls will be filled into the cavity which was about 30 feet deep and of considerable diameter.  
Special rates become effective Saturday for fishermen into Wallawa county as far as Lostine. The early

Sunday morning train will be inaugurated within a fortnight it is believed.

The date of the special train from Wallawa county to the Union Stock show has been set for June 15th. Traveling Passenger Agent Jim Miller, who is as busy as a proverbial bee at honey-making time, has completed arrangements. The special leaves Joseph at 6 a. m., leaves La Grande at 10 a. m., and returning leaves Union at 7 p. m.

Tomorrow an exodus of boys and girls will begin with Pendleton as a mecca. The Boys' and Girls' conference there is the lodestone. With a tremendous passenger traffic eastward the O. W. will have its hands full handling the traffic the other way.

To top off Union Pacific passenger business, the Rose Show is about to begin, and the La Grande sleeper will be entirely inadequate, no doubt. Almost every night available space in that car is taken by Portland sojourners.
