England Opens Fashion Show
London, June 2.—Great Britain today struck the first blow in disregard of the Rue de la Paix's feminine fashions.

It was an all British fashion show at Agricultural Hall, Islington, North London which, despite the government mandate of wartime economy, displays all the frills and furbelows of mid-lady's summer supply.

Wax figures and animate flesh and blood models display the lampshade skirt, the shepherdess' design and panniers, all of which emphasize hips and fall toward the floor away from the ankles.

Rich shades of brown and emerald greens give no hint that Germany has kept all the dyes.

There also is the wartime garment recommended for working girls, a kind of harem skirt—really baggy trousers devoid of mannishness.

Bathing costumes so complete from cap to slippers that even Hyde Park wouldn't blush, are a feature of the exhibition. Contrasted shades of plain black or brown promise to be the prevailing mode on British bathing beaches.

Houses, waists and other things are all designed by British "modistes." Over 200,000 buyers were invited to the all British fashion show from everywhere including America and excepting Austria, Germany, Bulgaria, Turkey and other enemy land.

Whisky Shipped as Beer Confiscated.
Roseburg, Or., May 31.—Deputies from Sheriff Quinn's office confiscated 456 quarts of whisky at Gardiner, Or., Monday, under the direction of District Attorney Neuner. The liquor had been shipped to Gardiner under false brand in the guise of beer. Some of it was in beer bottles, but every quart was a measure of whisky instead of beer. The prevailing sale price for a quart of whisky is reported to have been \$3, making the retail value of the confiscated liquors about \$1360. No arrests have been made, although several may follow.

A quantity of salmon was also confiscated the same day by game wardens at Winchester. The salmon, it is alleged, were caught on lark lines near the dam, an illegal method and a prohibited place.

The "Lancet," leading British journal of medicine, in an exhaustive technical treatise on "pica," or human craving for unnatural articles of diet, announced today that a Dutch wharf laborer recovered after attempting to digest 3 pounds and eleven ounces of hardware.

Discharged from hospital, the patient left behind a 5-inch coal chisel weighing eleven ounces and a large assortment of coins, bolts, nuts, rivets, wire nails, tin tacks, screws and hooks and a number of small flints he had swallowed.
