3 Vacancies Filled.

Pendleton, June 1.—At a meeting of the school board held yesterday, three vacancies in the high school faculty for next year were filled by the election of J. Laurence Whitman to the chair of science, Miss Camille Dolson as instructor in the department of Latin and German and Mr. Fendish to the department of agriculture.

This action fills all vacancies except the principalship which, it is announced, will probably not be filled until late in the summer. The normal department has been abolished and Miss Norma Graves, the normal instructor, has been shifted to another department. She and the principal will take the classes formerly conducted by Mrs. Osmer E. Smith.

TAPESTRIES BRING FORTUNE.

Deal Closed in New York Today Represents Heavy Outlays.

New York, June 1.—Eight hundred thousand dollars in cash was paid to P. W. French & Co. here today by Joseph E. Widener of Philadelphia for two pieces of cloth, neither of them very large. For one Mr. Widener paid \$600,000 and for the other \$200,000. They were two of the \$2,000,000 collection of rare tapestries, gathered together from the four corners of the earth by the late J. Pierpont Morgan and sold after his death by his son J. P. Morgan. The tapestries were today removed from their places in the Metropolitan Museum and delivered to Mr. Widener, who took them to his Philadelphia home. The Mazarin tapestry is one of the greatest works of its kind extant and some authorities have written that it is without a peer in the whole world of art. It was owned by Cardinal Mazarin, who guided the Government of France during the minority of Louis XIV, and hence it is always identified by his name. It is one of those splendid picture cloths which are associated with the golden age of tapestry. It was woven about the year 1500. Its foundation is silk and wool and it is rich in thread of silver and gold. Its striking contrasts in material and the treatment of ribs and hatchings combine into a woven picture which is convincing and comprehensive. The work is composed as a triptych. It is divided by Gothic columns into three divisions and the side wings in turn are divided two-thirds of the way up by Gothic arches.
