### GOOD GAMES AT 2 PARKS

LA GRANDE WINNER OVER IMBLER IN THE TENTH.

Bud Garity broke up a hummer 10-inning ballgame at the fair grounds yesterday evening by poling out a drive to short right scoring Melnis from third. Imbler was the opposition and presented one of the most stubborn resistances to a La Grande victory that has been witnessed in years. In spite of the dust storm, the two teams and a few spectators witnessed a battle-royal pitchers' tussle. For seven innings the two teams struggled to a scoreless fight although both aggregations had runners thrown out at the plate on close decisions repeatedly. In the last of the seventh Walden went safe on Oliver's boot and scored third when Childers poked off his second clean hit of the day. Imbler rang the bell twice in the next inning when Bell started a rally. Bell himself was thrown out at the plate by a quick throw from McLean but a moment later Rollins was sent home by Dan Conklin's substantial whack that also put Berry over the pan, he having previously registered at first on a fielder's choice. On frequent occasions thereafter Imbler crowded the home plate hard but didn't get a solitary score except in the eighth which tied the score.

The pitching staffs were the chief attractions. Jeff Bell whiffed 15 men and Melnis 12, which is some total strike-outs for the day we guess. Bell allowed three hits in the 10 innings. Feastivities took a recess in the beginning of the extra canto when Imbler flustered over some of Umpire Pennywell's decisions. After prolonged debate a compromise was struck, Anderson taking the balls and strike arbitration job and Pennywell retiring. The game then proceeded until the big bust-up came. Copious errors cropped into the game but for all that it was a better affair than

the gilt-edge show with Elgin a few weeks back. Seldom has a better pitching duel been fought here. In some ways Bell had the bulge on "Heck" Melnis but when Melnis weakened perceptibly, his teammates stiffened their defense and saved the day. Imbler's ballteam is a hard one to beat for they persist to the end. Jeff had good luck with his breaks and pitched one of the best games of his career, which also did "Heck." Without a doubt, it was a real ball game.

"Pere" Childers has never been recognized as a Ty Cobb or a Tris Speaker, exactly, but he sure had Jeff Bell's number yesterday. The first time up he threw his hat at an offering and the bingle so surprised the Imbler infield that he went safe on it; the next time he singled, going to second on the play; the third time he drove a hard one to the outfield and the last time flew out to center field. Bud Garity, likewise not recognized

as a genius with the stick was the only other to single off Bell—the old-time stickers with reputations got nowhere yesterday.

Dan Conklin's timely hit saved Imbler from a shutout. If Imbler ever needed a hit in her life it was just then—and Conklin produced.

Melnis tried a pinch hitter in the fifth when a score was a possibility, sending Palmer into Kingsley's place, but on that occasion and twice later, Palmer fanned.

Imbler's batting order need fixing. Her strikes are not consistently arranged and had their sequence been different yesterday she would have scored oftener.

"Speed" Meserve came near starting a real riot—at a time when riots were in order—by offering to wager five bones with an excited Imbler supporter, who by the way played with North Yakima here in the Tri-state days. Imbler was disputing Pennywell's decision calling Bell out at the plate. "What are you guys beefing about" speaketh "Speed." "Whenever there are two on bases the runner, from third has to slide home, not come in straight up like Bell did—you fellows ought to know that." A good many on the Imbler bench fell for the bait and ragged at Meserve for an hour. In the meantime the funster was enjoying the rumpus.

Good Game at Elgin.  
Elgin, June 5.—(Special)—Cove and Elgin had a splendid game here yesterday the score being one all at the opening of the ninth inning, when Elgin put across the winning run. The game was a hummer from start to finish. Blumenstein and Alexander were the pitchers.

Seized Liquors Are Returned.  
Seattle, Wash., June 3.—Five truckloads of wine and whisky seized by the police May 12, when the Chartier drug store in the Savoy hotel building was raided, were ordered returned to the drug store yesterday by Police Judge John Bordon. The order was issued when it was shown that the liquor had been purchased before the prohibition law went into effect January 1, and had been distributed only in the manner prescribed by law. The court also dismissed charges of unlawfully having liquor in their possession filed against J. C. Chartier, proprietor of the drug store, and W. G. King, manager of the hotel. This is the first instance of a large amount of liquor having been returned to the owners, since the police began their crusade against drug stores alleged to be selling liquor in violation of law.

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, proposes and intends to improve Section Five of Sewer District Number Three of the City of La Grande by constructing therein a sanitary sewer and that the report of the Committee on Estimates appointed under and by resolution of the Commission of said City of date April 26, 1916, has made its report in writing to the Commission which report was on the 19th of May, 1916, finally approved and adopted by the Commission of said City and said Commission has set Wednesday, the 14th day of June, A. D., 1916 at 7:30 o'clock P. M. at the Commission room in the City Building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when the Commission will meet, hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance of persons interested therein and affected thereby. That the boundaries of the said District to be so improved, as finally adopted by said Commission is as follows: Commencing at the center of Block Nineteen, in Coggan's Addition to La Grande, Oregon, and running thence west along the center line of said Block Nineteen and along the center lines of Blocks 54, 53, 52 and 51 of Chaplin's Addition to the Town of

La Grande, Union County, Oregon, to the center of Fourth Street in said Chaplin's Addition; thence south along the center line of said Fourth Street to a point 120 feet south of the south property line of L. Avenue of said Chaplin's Addition; thence west to the center of First Street in said Chaplin's Addition; thence south along the center line of First Street to a point thereon west of the center of Block 85 of said Chaplin's Addition; thence east through the center of said Block 85 of said Addition to the center line of Second Street in said Chaplin's Addition; thence south along the center line of Second Street to the center line of I Street, now known and described as I Avenue, in said Chaplin's Addition; thence east 18 feet to the center of the inter-sections of Second Street and said I Avenue; thence south along the center of Second Street in said Addition to the center line of H. Avenue and Seventh Street to the center of the inter-section of J. Avenue and Seventh Street, and a ten-inch vitrified sewer with manholes and connections from the center of the inter-section of J. Avenue, formerly J. Street, and Seventh Street in said Chaplin's Addition, along the center line of said J. Avenue to the center of the inter-section of said J. Avenue and Seventh Street in said Addition, and from the center of the inter-section of Second Street and I. Avenue, formerly I. Street, in said Addition, along the center line of said I. Avenue to the center of the intersection of said I. Avenue and Seventh Street in said Chaplin's Addition, with the necessary manholes and connections, together with the necessary excavations therefor.
