Governor Withycombe Proclaims Flag Day as State Event.

FLAG DAY PROCLAMATION

Whereas, June 14th, 1916, is the 139th anniversary of the adoption of the Stars and Stripes; and
Whereas, Organizations of a patriotic nature in Oregon are desirous that special emphasis be placed upon this day and its meaning; and
Whereas, This generation has no time when loyalty and patriotism are more required than now, or when the encouragement of these vital national virtues is more appropriate;
Now Therefore, I do hereby proclaim Wednesday, June 14th, as FLAG DAY throughout the State of Oregon, and I earnestly urge that the day be devoted to exercises indicative of and conducive to loyalty to the Flag; that in homes, schools, churches and places of business, and that occasion be fittingly observed; that the Flag be displayed from public buildings, schools, homes and places of business, and that the entire commonwealth, at this critical period of international unrest, unite in honoring the FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA and in pledging renewed and vigorous loyalty to it and the principles of liberty it represents.
In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and cause the Great Seal of the State of Oregon to be hereunto affixed this third day of June, 1916.
