ure was brought to bear to secure direct assistance in perfecting organization among fruit growers than for help in any other line of industry. The result was that three of the best experts of the Federal Office of Markets have spent three months in devising a plan which will apparently greatly relieve the marketing situation if a large majority of the tonnage can be controlled by one organization.

The Federal Office of Markets strongly urges that each separate district in the Northwest become thoroughly acquainted with the plan and actually organized and drilled in the fundamentals of marketing including physical handling, standardization and organization. The campaign outlined by the Federal authorities calls for a threefold plan:

First, an explanation of the clearing house plan for marketing the crop; second, local problems of organization; third, physical handling. It is necessary that the business men of a community as well as the growers and shippers become thoroughly familiar with the details of this plan. The meeting on June 10 will be addressed by representatives of the Federal Office of Markets and the Oregon Agricultural College.

The plan will be presented to the fruit growers in order that they may determine what this district will do. If it is decided at this meeting to accept the plan, steps will be immediately taken to bring about the necessary organization and adjustments. Committees will be appointed and College or Federal representatives will assist in perfecting final arrangements. Fruit growers, bankers and business men generally throughout the state recognize the great importance of this matter and are aiding in financing the campaign which the College Extension Service is now carrying on.

Gossip From New York

The American Federation of Labor has evidently popularized its method of procedure, since the manufacturing interests of their country, who have been holding their convention in New York during the past week, have announced that they propose to form a union in order that all business interests may unite through a representative central organization—the same as the laboring men have done. Manufacturers feel that there are different interests and branches in commercial and industrial organizations that are working in conflicting ways, that there must be a central organization. As further evidence of the superior methods of the Federation of Labor, it has been broadly published that the Authors' League of America will become a union and may affiliate with the American Federation. The great American Authors are contemplating a strike, but they have important interests that should be protected and among those are the infringements upon their rights by the moving picture concerns.

New York publishers are materially changing the style of their newspapers, and there is a material decrease in their number of illustrations that are being used. Feature stories and special articles have never been so little demand in New York sent time. Unquestionably some of the papers have been seriously affected through the shortage in paper stock, and as a result the return of unsold copies and their curtailment of extras has been one of the ways in which economy has been put into practice. The conditions that have affected the small publishers throughout the country have hit New York hard.

That New York is a decidedly healthy place in which to live, is shown by an official statement made by the Department of health last week. Only 1580 deaths were reported in the city, as compared with 1609 during the corresponding week last year. The death rate this year is 14.71 per cent for each thousand of population, which so far for 1916, is .24 per cent point lower than for the corresponding period last year. The principal maladies and diseases that have caused serious sickness and death this year are diphtheria, whooping cough, and Bright's disease. Within the last year there has been

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a marked falling in the number of cases of measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, cancer, influenza and affections of the nervous system.

President For A Day

President Wilson's term of office will expire at noon of March 4, 1917, which will be a dies non, that is to say Sunday.

The successor to the president cannot be inaugurated on Sunday so there will be an ad interim executive holding the office from Sunday noon to the following Monday noon.

The constitution provides that in event of a vacancy in the office of chief executive, due to death or disability, the vice president shall succeed, but if there is no vice president as there will not be, after noon March 4, then the succession goes to a cabinet officer beginning with the secretary of state, next the secretary of the treasury, secretary of war, attorney general and so on down the list. According to a theory which has been advanced the term of both president and vice president will expire at noon of March 4th and their successors cannot qualify before noon of the next day, thus creating a vacancy which must be temporarily filled by the secretary of state so that Mr. Lansing will be president for a day. But the secretary does not go out of office automatically with the retirement of his chief. His tenure of office is supposed to hold until his successor has qualified. But should not that practice hold good also as to the chief magistrate and all other officers of the government? If Mr. Wilson should be re-elected, which now seems most probable, what would be the occasion for any ad interim.

The suggestion that if Mr. Bryan had continued in office until March 4, next he might have realized his ambition to become president if only for a day, is probably the only excuse for presenting a situation that might arise in the event that President Wilson should not be re-elected to the office he now holds!—San Antonio Express.
