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JUNE CROP ESTIMATE OUT

GOVERNMENT FIGURES COM-
PILED FOR OREGON.

Oregon Apple Crop Estimate About
Normal.

Washington, D. C., June 8, 1916. A summary of the June crop report for the State of Oregon and for the United States, as compiled by the Bureau of Crop Estimates (and transmitted through the Weather Bureau) U. S. Department of Agriculture, is as follows:

Winter Wheat.
State: June 1 forecast, 11,400,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate) 16,260,000; bushels.
United States: June 1 forecast, 469,000,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate) 655,045,000 bushels.

Spring Wheat.
State: June 1 forecast, 3,710,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate) 3,825,000; bushels.
United States: June 1 forecast, 246,000,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate) 356,460,000 bushels.

Oats.
State: June 1 forecast, 13,000,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate) 16,060,000 bushels.
United States: June 1 forecast, 1,250,000,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate) 1,540,363,000 bushels.

Barley.
State: June 1 forecast, 4,130,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate) 4,080,000 bushels.
United States: June 1 forecast, 189,000,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate) 237,009,000 bushels.

Hay.
State: June 1 condition 89, compared with the eight year average of 95.
United States: June 1 condition 90.3, compared with the eight-year average of 87.6.

Apples.
State: June 1 forecast, 1,020,000 barrels; production last year (final estimate) 1,043,000 barrels.
United States: June 1 forecast, 72,000,000 barrels; production last year (final estimate) 76,670,000 barrels.

Prices.
The first price given below is the average on June 1 this year, and the second, the average on June 1 last year.

State: Wheat, 87 and 109 cents per bushel. Corn, 80 and 92. Oats, 45 and 49. Potatoes, 73 and 111. Hay \$13.00 and \$9.20 per ton. Eggs 22 and 20 cents per dozen.
United States: Wheat 100.0 and 131.5 cents per bushel. Corn 74.1 and 77.9 cents. Oats, 42.1 and 51.3 cents. Potatoes, 98.8 and 50.8 cents. Hay \$12.50 and \$11.96 per ton. Eggs 190 and 16.6 cents per dozen. Cotton 12.2 and 8.6 cents per pound.

The Sherman demonstration lasted 25 minutes.

Then Wood of Indiana, nominated Fairbanks.

Burton's Ovation Longest

Burton's demonstration lasted 25 minutes, then the roll call proceeded.

Connecticut yielded to Massachusetts.

Lodge then nominated Weeks, which resulted in brief applause.

Miller of Delaware, nominated Dupont.

Calhoun of Illinois, started a speech nomination Sherman of Illinois at 2:50 o'clock.

Gov. Frank B. Willis of Ohio, in nomination Theo. E. Burton said in part:

History is to be made here today; we shall make America greater or disappoint a world. A mighty people, yea, and nations beyond the seas await our verdict. We are not gathered to pluck the fragrant flowers of eloquence, to indulge in fulsome self-glorification or to engage in unhappy factional contest. A reunited, determined, forward-looking Republican party demands that mere personal ambitions and pride of opinion shall give way to the welfare of the party and the country. The faces of the mighty dead look down upon us and inspire us to achievement, worthy of their heroic example. "United, we win; divided, the Democrats win and the country loses."

The Republican party this year means business, and it expects us to transact that business patriotically, unselfishly and with an eye single to the nation's weal.

The fires of hatred and factional strife have burned out.
