FAIRBANKS SECOND CHOICE

181. Soon afterward the convention chose C. W. Fairbanks as vice-presidential nominee.

Illinois First to Quit
Illinois was the first state to withdraw her favorite son in Hughes' favor. Others clambered aboard the band wagon with a regular scramble soon after the convention met.

The selection of Hughes came after Roosevelt had made a last hour attempt to swing Henry Cabot Lodge in as a compromise candidate for Progressives and Republicans.

Nomination Made Unanimous
After the uproar following the nomination had subsided, Alexander Moore of Pennsylvania, moved to make the nomination unanimous. It carried.

Band Wagon Procession On
Sherman, Weeks, Fairbanks, Burton, Cummins, Brumbaugh and Dupont successively withdrew in favor of Hughes. Stevenson of Colorado, announced all Roosevelt delegates were released from their obligation to vote for the Colonel.

Congratulations Sent Hughes
Chairman Harding telegraphed to Hughes as follows: "With deliberation and enthusiasm, under circumstances which couldn't have been more complimentary and with unanimity never expected, you have been nominated by the Republicans as a candidate for President of the United States.

Voicing sentiments of the convention over which I have presided, I congratulate you and the country upon the outcome of the convention."

Wanamaker of Philadelphia, nominated Fairbanks, and Baldrige of Nebraska nominated Elmer Burkett. These were the only vice-presidential nomination. The official vote: Fairbanks 863, Burkett 108, Borah 8, Johnson 1, Burton 1, Webster 22. The

nomination was thereafter made unanimous.

Convention adjourned 2:02 p. m. Harding announced a reply from Hughes, accepting the nomination, was coming.

Steam Roller Brought Out
It was perfectly apparent soon after convening, Republicans proposed to run their own steam roller over Roosevelt's aspirations. Brief but sharp applause greeted announcement of the third ballot. California and Oregon led the parade with banners. Massachusetts gave 32 of its 36 votes to Hughes. Governor McCall explained that although the delegates appreciated the fitness of Lodge, nevertheless they felt the spirit of the convention was for Hughes.

Willis, of Ohio, concurred in withdrawing Burton's name. After Wanamaker had nominated Fairbanks, Kentucky, Maine and Ohio seconded it. Balloting started quickly after Burkett was nominated.

Webster Gets Two Votes.
The Oregon delegates split, voting Fairbanks 7, Borah 1, Webster 2. These were the only votes Webster received. Webster was Oregon's vice presidential choice at the recent primaries.

DEATH OF MRS. PIDCOCK.

Prominent L. D. S. Member Passes Away After Severe Illness.

Died, at midnight last night, Mrs. Mary A. Pidcock, wife of Hiram B.

Pidcock, in the 57th year of her age. Mrs. Pidcock had been afflicted for a considerable period with a severe malady and although making a hard struggle at last yielded to the decree which comes to all.

The family came to La Grande from Ogden fourteen years ago and during their residence here the deceased was a constant and devoted member of the L. D. S. faith of which she was a life-long adherent.

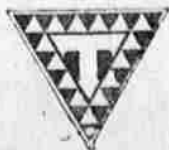
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
