Labor Leaders Again Ask Help

Washington, June 10.—Because only \$132,138.55 of the needed \$250,000 was subscribed by American laboring men to pay the judgment against the homes of the aged Danbury hatters in the famous Danbury Boycott case, the American Federation has named June 15th as the day upon which labor should contribute the needed \$117,000 additional.

The federation's request says that "all workers who did not contribute on January 27th are earnestly requested to contribute the wares of an hour's labor Thursday June 15th."

GRAND JURY IS IN RECESS

MANY CASES "DITCHED" IN JURY ROOM

Ten Indictments Found—Poor Farm Management More Economical

Following is the grand jury report in full as filed when that body asked to be excused last evening:

To the Hon. J. W. Knowles, Circuit Judge:

We, the grand jury for this term, beg leave to report that we have been in session five days and have reported into court nine true bills of indictment and no true bills.

We have examined into many other cases and have found action on same unnecessary and unprofitable.

We have visited the county poor farm and find it in good shape. We are informed that the expenses of operating same for the current year will be considerably less than last year, due to greater economy in labor and provisions, especially in decrease in number employed and discontinuation of purchasing meat and in consuming what is raised on the farm.

As required by law, we have examined into the condition of most of the public prisons of the county and find same neat and clean. The county offices all seem to be run in excellent

shape and we have found the various county officers obliging and apparently correctly performing their duties. We note that the various county books are kept exceedingly neat and clean.

We thank your honor for courtesy extended to us in our duties and the district attorney for his readiness to assist and to promptly furnish necessary information and advice. Our bailiff has been prompt and efficient. We have been unable to finish all matter before us at this session but do not consider it advisable to remain longer in session at this time, and ask to be excused until the further order of the court.
