Blaine, secretary of state, who resigned his office to become a presidential aspirant, was his closest competitor. Whitelaw Reid was the unanimous choice for vice-president and both were defeated by Cleveland and Stephenson.

During his term of office President Harrison and some members of his cabinet visited the Pacific coast and on the return made a stop at La Grande. The event was duly celebrated although the stop at this point was only about ten minutes. There was a large crowd of people from both Union and Wallowa counties present. President Harrison spoke briefly from the rear of the platform and he was followed by John Wannamaker, postmaster general. Jerry Lusk, the secretary of agriculture, was called on but had retired and did not respond.

The state election returns seem to indicate the election of George E. Chamberlain, Democratic candidate for attorney general.

The Union County Farmer, the new People's party organ, made its appearance last Friday.

The three La Grande precincts cast 862 votes. In each precinct there were a number of defective ballots which were thrown out. There is no doubt that the present voting system admits of improvements but it is far better than the former system and is certainly a long step in the direction of purer elections.

The board of directors for La Grande school district has secured the services of Prof. C. B. Leathemann of Union as principal for next year.

Friends of Mr. Woods, both in public and private life, had come to regard him as a confirmed bachelor. Even those closest to him in the affairs of the great department of which he is the head had no hint that he ever thought of romance as they went about the unromantic business of the department together.

Miss Hamilton was introduced to society a year and a half ago. She stepped immediately into the front ranks of the young set in society. She became a member of the Colony Club and joined the Junior League.

Through her father and mother she is descended from well-known American families that have been identified with public life for many generations. Her mother, who was Miss Juliet P. Morgan, is one of the four children of the late financier and philanthropist, the others being Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan, Mrs. Herbert L. Satteries and Miss Anne T. Morgan.

Mr. Woods, after having been Mayor Mitchell's private secretary for three months, was designated Police Commissioner in 1914.
