

THE FLAT IS BEING WORKED

ROAD CREWS BUSY IN ELGIN VICINITY.

Count Court Visited Scenes of Operations Last Week.

(Elgin Recorder.)

Extensive road work is under way on that portion of the main road known as Roullet hill and near Highland school house. The work is being carried on jointly by the County court and farmers of that section. During recent months the county has expended approximately \$500 in blasting out proper drainage ditches, the work covering a distance of about a half a quarter. To complete the work inaugurated by the county, the wide-awake farmers of the Flat donated work to the amount of several hundred dollars, which they began Wednesday of last week and have been working from 12 to 15 men with several teams, and according to figures are daily putting in \$50 worth of work.

The work now under way consists of hauling the larger rock blasted out on stone boats and placing the same on the road bed, and these are covered over with finer rock carried by scrapers. The road bed then is given a surface of dirt, hauled from nearby fields.

All members of the County court visited the scene of operations Tuesday afternoon and express themselves as being highly pleased with the character and progress of the improvement. It is expected to keep the work going on until the improvement is entirely completed. It is estimated that already \$1000 has been spent on the short stretch of road, and the county is now employing three men there in addition to the extensive work being done by the farmers.

Big Shovel at Work.

J. C. Wise commenced work this morning on the gravel pit on the Grant Dalton land with a small crew of men. The steam shovel is under

the charge of P. J. Nee, engineer, assisted by E. Smith, a man, both of Portland.

Foreman Wise informs us that it will likely be three months ere the work is completed and that it will require not less than 1,000 cars of gravel to complete the work from near Wingville to this city.

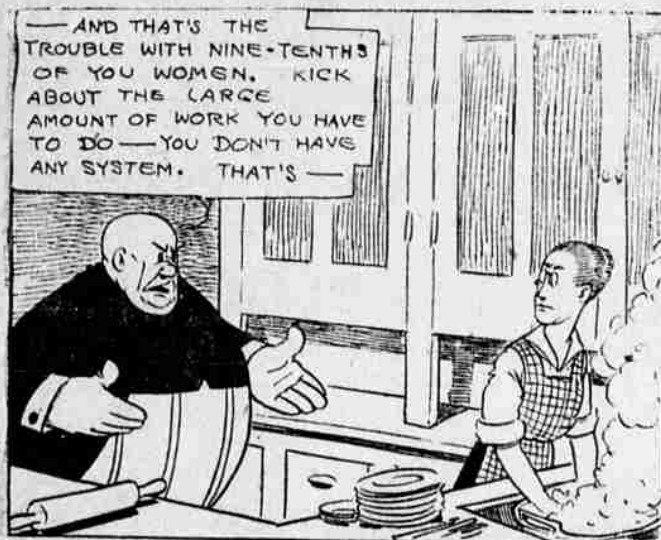

Asks \$10,000 Damages
Oregon City, Or., June 9.—D. W. Olds filed suit Thursday in the Circuit court against Edwin Olds, for \$10,000 damages for injuries received while working on a bridge, which was constructed by Edwin Olds over the Sandy river for the county court. The accident, according to the complaint filed happened on September 4, 1915, and was primarily due to a defective wagon. The complaint alleges that Edwin Olds directed the plaintiff to drive a span of horses, attached to this defective wagon, over a rocky roadway, and in so doing the wagon broke, resulting in injuring the plaintiff to such an extent that he was kept from his work for many months.

STOCK SHOW PROMOTERS HAVE LIGHT HEARTS

Opening Wednesday at Noon Seems Certain To Have Good Weather

Union, June 12.—(Special)—Stock-show week opened with sunshine bursting over the hilltops in a most promising manner—at the same time that the directors and citizenship in general are knocking on wood they declare rain is not going to be a bugaboo for the Northwest classic this year. By Wednesday noon the big show will be on and it is needless to say the exhibition of stock will be sweeping and thoroughly representative of the county for no stockman dares overlook the opportunity to display his animal wares at this attraction. Special numbers promise to be superb, and with a week of sun promised, Union awoke this morning with glad hearts.

Secretaries On Ground
The work of the Stock Show secretary at the grounds this week will be in the hands of A. G. Smith, W. W. Stevens and Fred Fox. One or all these men will be on the grounds prepared to take entries, and will up to and through the show. All parties desiring to make entries are asked to leave same with Secretaries at the grounds or with the Secretary at the Republican office. It is a good plan to hand in entries early.

Additional bleachers have been constructed to handle the crowds the second day. That is another problem. So many believe that it is best and most expedient to crowd the grounds the second day when, as a matter of fact, the first or third day is equally good. The directors always have to contend with this knotty question—how to fill the grounds the first day and how to accommodate them on the second.

Work at the Grounds
Two new stock sheds—about 170 feet in all—are being erected at the stock show grounds and will be completed this week. Repairs generally are finished, the track is in fine condition, some stock on the grounds and in training, and everything will be in readiness when the big show opens on the 14th. Time is short—prepare to make the show this year the best ever.
