HOME-GROWN VARIETY COMING FORWARD.

Oranges Scarce, with Navel Type Practically Out of Season.

Home-grown gooseberries are on the market, selling at 40 cents for the unstemmed kind. At the same time home-grown lettuce is coming forward and the California variety disappearing, and for a few days the quality of the home production will not be fully headed out, but is pretty good at that.

Oranges are getting scarcer, and higher. Navel varieties are practically gone and the others are gradually becoming more scarce.

Otherwise the market opened this week with good strength, plenty of offerings coming forward, and a generally healthy condition prevalent.
