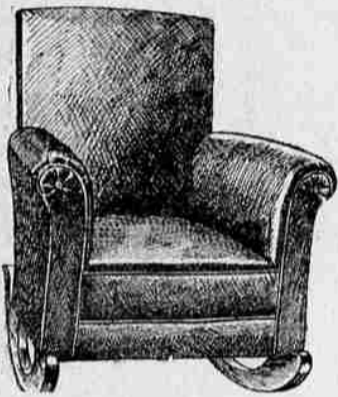

Library Table Art and Craft Pattern



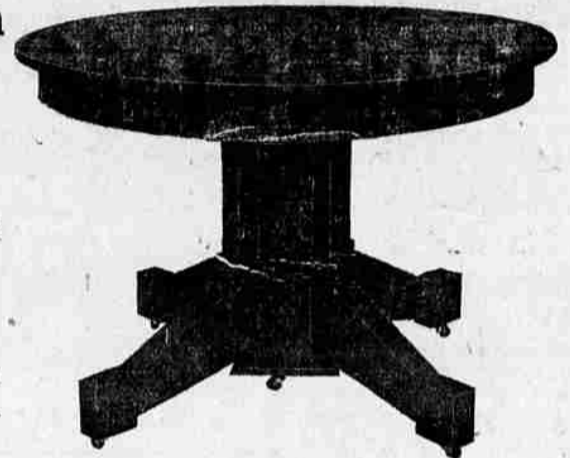

Prehistoric Fossil Found

Pendleton, June 15.—E. F. Averill, district inspector of predatory animals this morning received from one of his trappers near Wallula what is pronounced as the fossil of a horn of a prehistoric ox or buffalo. It was dug out of the earth by the trapper while he was setting his trap in a coyote den. The fossil is of the core of the horn of the ordinary buffalo. The trapper writes that the head of the animal, as shown by the fossilized bones found, was over three feet long. One of the horns has crumbled but the other is intact. Mr. Averill will send for the head and ship the whole to Washington, D. C. Stanley Jewett, Mr. Averill's assistant, estimates that the fossil is several thousand years old.
