Programs Chautauquas to Hear Sequoia Singers

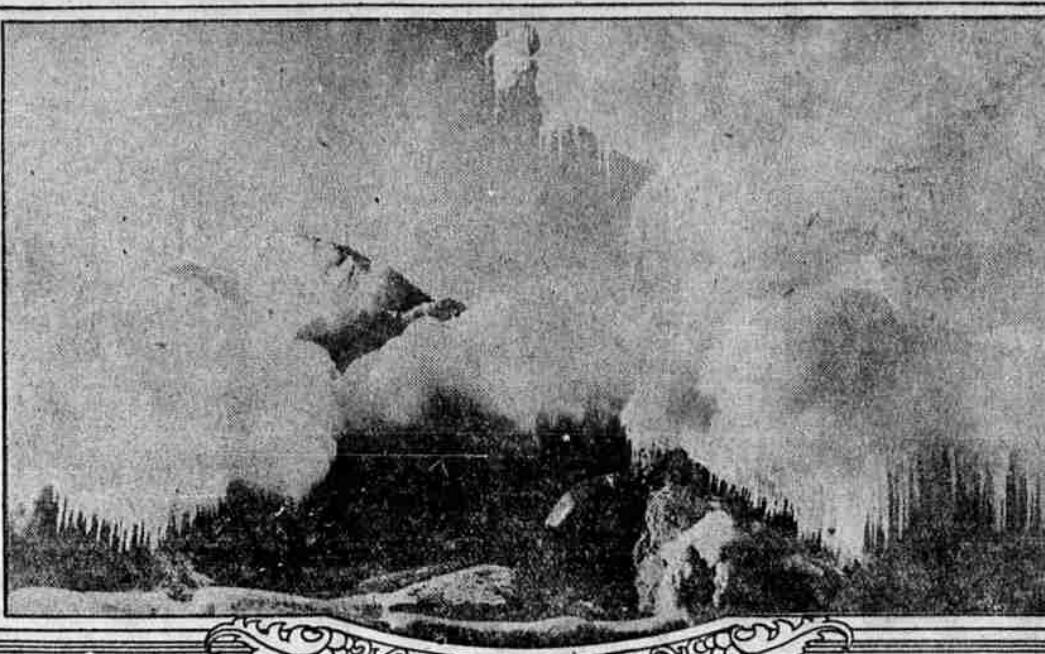

SIR DOUGLAS MAWSON'S marvelous motion pictures, which are to be shown at the Chautauqua, show some of the world's wildest wonders. Bird, animal and deep sea life in great variety, towering cliffs, mammoth icebergs and blinding blizzards follow each other upon the screen in such a riot of indescribable display that they fairly stagger the imagination.

The pictures show hundreds of seals, sea elephants, sea leopards, whales, cormorants, skua gulls, penguins and petrels; showing many varieties of each, old and young; showing them in the water and out of it; showing their rookeries, their feeding places and their habits; showing them basking cozily on the ice or tossed by raging seas or blizzards. Sugar Co. Takes Over Plant in Oregon

Salt Lake, June 8.—At a meeting of the stockholders of the Oregon-Utah Sugar company yesterday, the action of the board of directors in selling the property to the Utah-Idaho Sugar company was confirmed. This means that the Oregon company will go out of existence and that the plant now being erected at Grant Pass, Or., will be completed by the Utah-Idaho Sugar company, which will carry out all contracts made by its predecessor.

Messrs. T. R. Cutler and C. W. Nibley of the two companies are in the east at present but at the office of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company today it was learned that the deal had been pending for some time and that under the contract, the beet crop now growing will be taken care of and harvested, the sugar plant finished and grinding of beets begun about the 1st of September.

Alex Nibley is to be the resident manager of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company at Grants Pass.

It was further learned at the sugar company's office that, under the terms of the contract, the cost of the Grants Pass factory will be practically the same as that of the modern plants now under construction at Brigham City and West Jordan by the Utah-Idaho company.

Mr. Alex Nibley said today: "As has already been printed, my father had decided on severing his connection with the Oregon-Utah company. Before the meeting, however, at which he intended presenting his resignation negotiations were opened with the Utah-Idaho Sugar company by which the sale of the property to them was made. The sale is in the nature of an option, as it is experimental for a term of two years, the Utah-Idaho Sugar company having that length of time to run the plant and then decide whether or not it desires to acquire it permanently. If it should not, under the contract, Mr. C. W. Nibley agrees to take the purchase over personally and to refund the Utah-Idaho company all the money it has advanced with interest."

Regarding a statement printed today that the stockholders of the Oregon-Utah had made over 250 per cent through the sale, Mr. Nibley said this was entirely misleading. The entire issued capital of the company was only \$200,000. The purchase price paid by the Utah-Idaho for its assets and all of its property of every description was \$100,000. This sum, the Oregon company would distribute among its stockholders, 35 to 40 in number, some of whom had advanced the company cash, others of whom had underwritten its bonds, and still others of whom had bought the stock on the market at prices varying from \$20 to \$80 a share, so that while some would realize a profit, others would stand a loss.

Mr. Nibley states that the beet growers and others interested are greatly pleased with the acquisition of the property by the Utah-Idaho company and that the growing crop is in excellent condition.

Manager T. R. Cutler will make a visit of inspection to the district as soon as he returns from the east.

Plattsburg, N. Y., June 3.—Major General Leonard Wood, commanding the Department of the East, wants it made clear that the training camp which opened here today is for every American citizen who wishes to be of aid to his country in case of war.

He called reporters to his headquarters to set at rest rumors that there was or would be, any social distinction whatever shown in recruiting men for the camp.

"Preparedness," said Major-Gen. Wood, "has caught on. So far more than 2,000 business men and others have signed for the Plattsburg camp this year. Among these there are a great number of college students. Princeton is leading with the largest enrollment of the colleges. We expect to have between 20,000 and 25,000 men here this year."

"The summer instruction camp idea is favored by many persons who cannot join us. A woman wrote me recently offering to pay the expenses of eight young men at Plattsburg."

"I have received many letters asking for an opportunity to help in this way. As two weeks is not long enough to acquaint a man with the necessary training for service, I wish to urge employers to extend vacations to their employees who are at the camp to a month. This seems the least time in which to instruct properly a man in the duties and requirements of a soldier."

"The Governors of Virginia and South Carolina appointed committees in the cities and towns of their states to organize groups for the camp, and their representations is large."
