SEND OUT.

Put in Ponds First.

TENNIS CLUBS ELECT HEADS

Y. M. C. A. HAS PERMANENT AD-
JUNCT NOW.

New Tennis Club Organized in South
La Grande—Other Notes.

Notwithstanding that the Y. M. C. A. has operated a tennis department for some little time, it was not until last evening that formal organization took place. While correlated to the Y. M. C. A. the tennis end is distinctly of itself. At the meeting S. D. Crowe was elected president, A. A. Wenzel treasurer, A. W. Nelson, secretary; and Mr. Crowe and General Secretary King are two committeemen with power to name one other to look after ground rules and such other executive matters as will come before the club. Technically it will be known as the Y. M. C. A. Tennis club, being a close adjunct to the Y. M. C. A. itself.

The first tournament, and it will begin within a fortnight, will be a handicap elimination, and other tournaments of interesting character will follow looking toward an inter-city tournament later on.

A new tennis association was born this week. It is the Olympian, and will have its courts at Fourth and H and will be in operation within a week's time it is expected. Scott A. Wheatley is chairman of the board, and Elmer A. Horstman is director of finance, Ralph Winters director of maintenance of material and equip-

ment. Besides the men mentioned other members are Ralph E. Byers, Guy Spencer, Leslie McPherson, H. C. Street, Tom A. Crawley, Howard Richardson and Jack Kerr. All are young men with promise of making good in tennis. It will be noted from the tone of managerial affairs that nearly all are railroad employes.

Realizing that it is expedient to the interest of the sport to keep their courts in use greater number of hours daily the La Grande Tennis club has thrown open its doors on the cement courts to honorary members. For a nominal fee men and women other than regular members will be licensed to liberal hours on the court. In fact during the day time generally very generous periods are set aside to honorary members. The scheme is especially appealing to women and such men as can get away in the forenoon for an hour or two of sport. The plans meet with popular favor as the splendid facilities on these courts are envied by those who have none or as good arrangements.
