CHURCHES TO HOLD SESSION

CHRISTIAN FAITH FOLLOWERS WILL MEET

Pendleton Makes Ready for Important Conclave Tomorrow.

Pendleton, June 20.—Ministers and prominent workers in the Christian churches of Eastern Oregon, together with some of the notable of that denomination from the western part of the state and from other sections of the country will meet in Pendleton June 21, 22, 23, 24 and 25 for the Eastern Oregon session of the annual state convention. The state convention is held annually in Turner, Ore., where a large permanent tabernacle has been constructed for the purpose but last year, the Eastern Oregon ministers secured the consent of the convention to gather for a district convention each year at Pendleton.

It is expected that the convention this year will bring 75 church workers to the city for five days. All of the heads of the Eastern Oregon churches will be here. The program includes interesting talks by these pastors, by state workers and by several easterners.

Among the visitors of note who will take part in the program are John H. Booth, of Kansas City, secretary of the state Extension Board, F. W. Burnham of Springfield, Ill., president of the A. C. M. S.; Mrs. Ida Harrison of Kentucky, a national worker in the field of the Christian church. Among the persons prominently connected with the work in this state are J. A. Lord, of Milton, formerly a well known eastern worker, Dean E. C. Sanderson of the Eugene Bible University, C. F. Swander, secretary of the state convention and E. S. Mulkey, in charge of northwest benevolence of the church.
